New Ticket Pick-Up Plan Being Proposed

A new ticket pick up proposal is planned by the Athletic Department for the Dec. 18 game with Texas Tech. It will be carried out in this order:

(1) At 6:30 a.m. officer will issue a claim check.

(2) Students will then come to desk set up in Fieldhouse, print the name and I.D. number for each of the tickets they wish to pick up (limit four). All registered I.D. cards must be left at desk.

(3) There will be no afternoon pick up of tickets.

(4) Night of the game, three tables will be set up at the student gate and each individual student will have to come and pick up I.D. with ticket inside.

(5) Nobody else can come and pick up a ticket other than those names signed on the list.

(6) At a quarter of eight,

the tickets of those students who have not picked up their I.D. will be given to those students in line.

Fieldhouse Director Bob Kirkpatrick said that he hoped that this would help in getting the tickets into the hands of the students who will use them.

'Honor Society Of Gold Key' Organized On WSU Campus

Over a year ago, two WSU faculty members decided to start a chapter of a national honor society on the campus of Wichita State.

Dr. F. William Nelson, English professor and honors coordinator, and Mrs. Josephine B. Fugate, Dean of Women, investigated the possibilities and inquired into Phi Kappa Phi, Phi Kappa Beta and Alpha Chi.

From these inquiries, it was learned that the customary way to become a member of a national fraternity of this kind is to first form a local honor fraternity upon which later consideration may be made.

The organizational meeting of the Honor Society of Gold Key was held Dec. 6 at 3 p.m. in the CAC Ballroom. Officers elected are: Dr. William Nelson, English professor and coordinator of the honors, president; Dr. Charles V. Jakowatz, Dean of the School of Engineering, vice-president; and Helen Crockett, Director of the Division of Continuing Education, secretary-treasurer.

The society's organization

committee, composed of Dean Fugate, Dean Jakowatz, Dr. John B. Breazeale, Dr. Robert G. Mood, Dr. Nelson, Dean J. Kelley Sowards, and Dean James J. Rhatigan, ex officio advisory member, adopted a constitution.

They decided that all faculty members who join during the first year of existence will be considered charter members. A membership committee will be appointed by Dr. Nelson to consider and invite students and alumni to join the Honor Society of Gold Key.

This organization was established

to provide an honor society open to honor students from all departments of the University. Its prime object is to emphasize scholarship and character in the thought of college students, to foster the significant purposes for which institutions of higher learning have been founded, and to stimulate mental achievement by recognition through election to membership.

Eligibility for membership is based upon the following criteria: any undergraduate student who has been registered in WSU for at least one year, and who is either enrolled in the final semester or quarter of his junior year, or is a senior in a four-year course is eligible. For consideration as a junior, the student must rank in the top five per cent of his college; for consideration as a senior, he must rank in the top ten per cent of his college. The total election from any class will not exceed ten per cent of those who will be candidates for graduation.

Parking Area Added

The east third of the Engineering parking lot is now open for student parking, according to Henry Malone, acting chairman of the parking committee.

As in the past, there will be a policeman on duty at the parking lot from 6 to 8 p.m. for the benefit of night school students.

2-Bit Flick Set Tonight

A Wichita official of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People attacked tonight's Two-Bit Flick presentation, "Birth of a Nation," calling it a "racist picture glorifying the Ku Klux Klan."

Chester I. Lewis, head of the Wichita NAACP, said "We are against spreading this kind of propaganda."

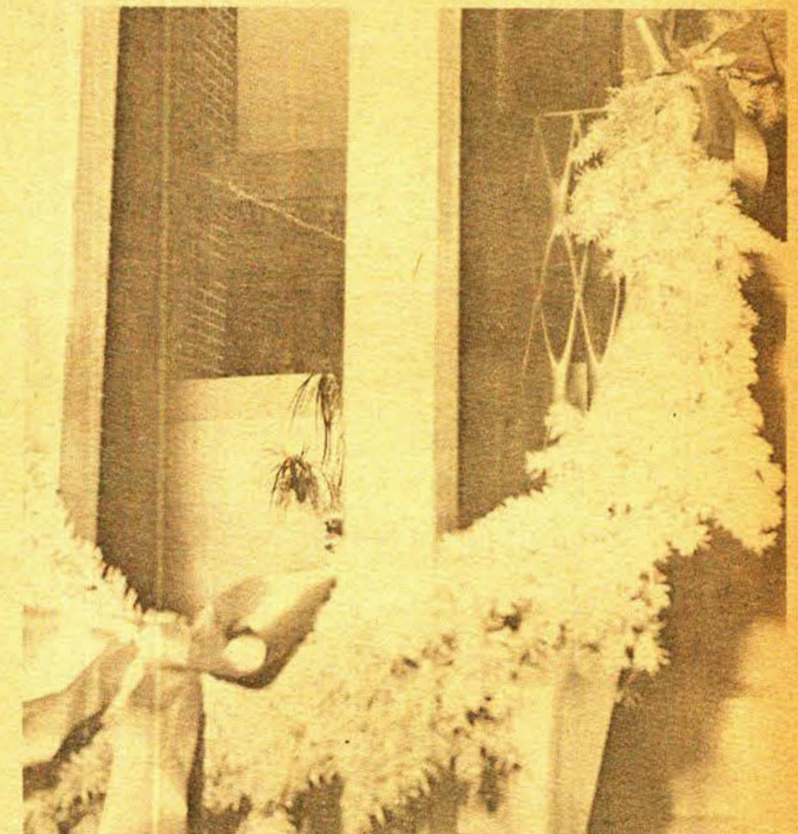
The film is scheduled for showing at 7:30 p.m. tonight in the CAC Ballroom.

"It's an ancient movie," said Lewis, "which attempts to give the Klan an amount of respectability which it never has had."

Jerry Battey, chairman of the Two-Bit Flick committee, had this to say about the picture--

"There are gross exaggerations of the Negro stereotype. The film uses pictures of the Ku Klux Klan and shows them as heroes."

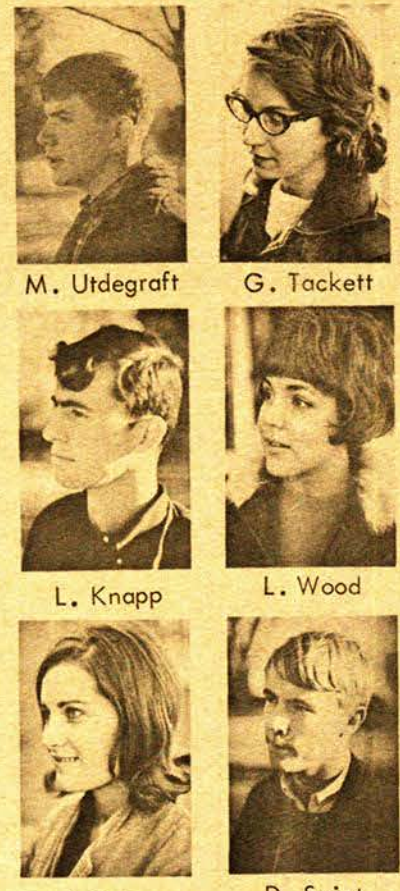

Some Good, Some Bad

Students Have Mixed Emotions About Pre-registration Advisers

Pre-registration took place last week. Students were to make an appointment with an adviser to make out a class schedule for next semester.

The student advising program was initiated with the purpose of having the faculty assist students in taking the necessary courses for graduation. Wichita State students were asked: "Do you think the student advising program is adequate? why or why not?"

Their comments: Michael Uptegraft, U.C. Fr. -- "Pre-registration and advising seem to be what's in the books. But when you get right down to it, it's a lot different. It's misleading if you ask me. The entire process seems to be unorganized.

"You never get to see your own adviser. She's always busy with someone else. There should be certain hours during which to set appointments, and the adviser should be able to keep the appointment.

"I set two appointments with my adviser and she has never been available. She is always advising others. I finally got everything done I was supposed to do, though. Part of the problem is because I waited until the time I was supposed to pre-enroll."

Glynda Tackett, U.C., Fr. -- "Pre-registration lines are crowded and it's hard to get in. I went to my adviser, however, and I had no trouble getting classes. I didn't really

know what I wanted to take and she helped me decide."

Larry Knapp, Ed., Soph. -- "The adviser I have now has helped me a lot. She helped me get the classes that I need and has been helpful in solving the problems which occurred when I transferred here."

Linda Wood, U.C., Fr. -- "I think for me the advising program has been adequate. I think that they need to match advisers and students according to their major fields, even in University College, if possible. Students should take advantage of the advising program, even if they don't have specific problems."

Denny Saint, U.C., Fr. -- "I had a little trouble getting in touch with my adviser but I found him when I needed him. I'm an engineering student, and my adviser has helped me to decide what classes I need. I don't know whether I have them yet or not because I haven't pulled my class cards, but I hope so."

Jane Taber, Ed., Jr. -- "I think in some areas it is adequate. It depends on who the student is and who the adviser is. I think the students and advisers should be matched better. When I came out here, I was shifted to several different advisers in two semesters. It was hard to know who to go to for help with my various problems.

"Recently, I was changed to an honors adviser. Before, I had a regular education adviser who had adequate sessions before enrollment where he helped all his advisees. I feel that group advising is good to an extent, but I think that they should also give individual advising to the students."

This proposed distribution plan will greatly reduce if not eliminate the infamous problem of ticket scalping as well as cut down the number of student hours that have been squandered.

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Seminars, Overseas Study, Travel Open At United Christian Fellowship In CAC

Most students aren't aware of it, but right at their front door lie opportunities for enrichment through seminars, service units, and overseas study and travel.

The United Christian Fellowship, located in the CAC, has information regarding these opportunities. Interested individuals should contact that office for additional information as soon as possible.

One of these opportunities is a United Nations Seminar, sponsored by the Wesley Foun-

ation at Kansas State University, scheduled for April 1 through April 10.

The bus tour will include three days in Washington, D.C., talking with officials in the State Department, Congressmen, other governmental officials, as well as representatives of non-governmental agencies and lobbying groups.

Visits are also scheduled to the United Nations headquarters and to one or two Delegation Headquarters, such as the United States or Russia. There

will be an opportunity to speak with representatives of the various U.N. agencies (UNESCO, UNICEF, etc.).

Another opportunity is the Weekend Institutional Service Unit, which is a project designed to help people to a greater understanding of the mentally retarded and the state institution.

Participants spend the weekend at the Winfield State Hospital and Training Center talking with the staff and working with the residents.

February 4, 5, and 6 are the dates for this project. Applicants must register by Jan. 31. Fee is \$1.50. The hospital provides room and meals.

Overseas study and travel are also available. Included is the following program:

A Study-Travel Seminar to Africa is scheduled for the summer of 1966. All students will be enrolled at the American University for six hours of either undergraduate or graduate credit.

The entire project will last 60 days, with scheduled departure, June 20, at Washington, D.C., and scheduled return, Aug. 18. Travel will be by air.

The itinerary will include the following major points (with some possible alternations): London, Senegal, Liberia, Ghana, Nigeria, Congo, Rhodesia, Zambia, Tanzania, Uganda, Kenya, Ethiopia and United Arab Republic.

Dralle Co-Authors Book On History

"Nine years of ocean-hopping to collaborate with an English colleague in the writing of a history book is quite a feat," commented Wichita State University professor, Lewis A. Dralle.


The book entitled, "The Political Journal of George Bubb Dodington," was co-authored by Dr. Dralle, head of the history department of WSU, and John Carswell, an employee of the British government.

According to reviewers, this book is the first publication of Dodington's diary which spans the critical decade of the 18th

century before George III's ascent to the throne. Dralle and Carswell have presented an intimate day-by-day picture of politics and high life as viewed from the inside through the tracing of Dodington's political career.

Dodington maintained an enormous circle of associates ranging from major politicians such as Newcastle and Henry Fox to obscure agents, officials, and journalists. Dr. Dralle added that this diary is concerned with the identification of these people, who include the youthful George III and his parents.



Cadet Larry Card has been selected as Air Force ROTC Cadet of the Month. Card was drawn from 800 cadets competing for the honor.

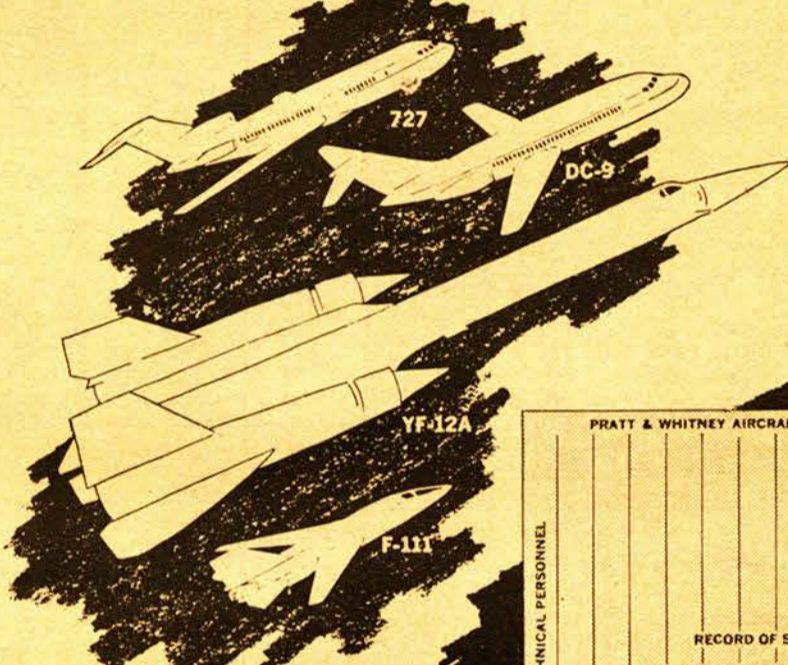
A freshman majoring in Chemistry, he intends to take four years of ROTC and make a career out of the Air Force.

He is a member of Squadron Six, Flight B, under the command of Lt. Marle Anderson.

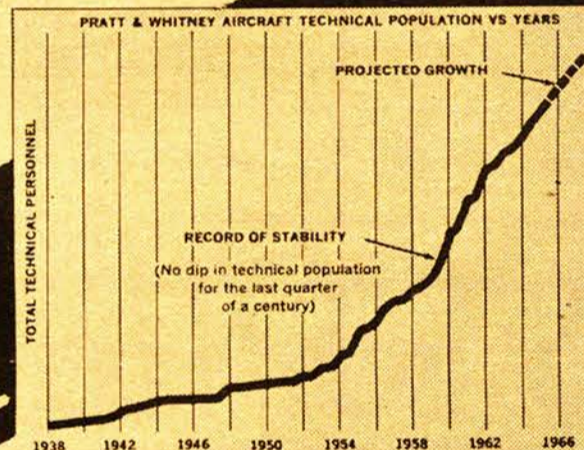

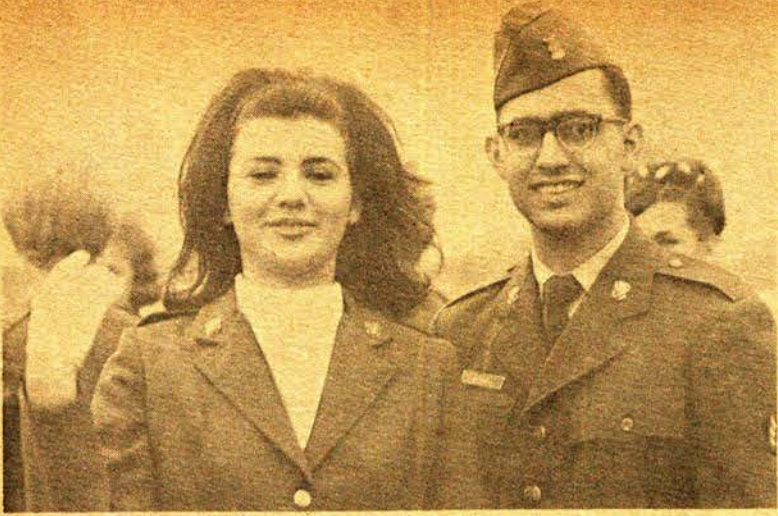


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Date With An Angel Won By ROTC Cadet

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Extensive Training Necessary For Police

Wichita Police officers attend classes at WSU in Police Science but they also have an academy of their own.

Sgt. James Hill, training instructor at the Wichita Police Academy, said the Academy is internationally recognized as a police training center because of its professionalism.

Wichita has over 300 officers and there is a constant need for training more because many take advantage of appointments with the FBI and other related assignments.

Hill said the Academy frequently receives foreign training requests, but the limited space and extensive local demands for the Wichita Police force has filled the space until 1968.

Police officer training is demanding and extensive. It consists of 10 to 12 weeks of rookie classes, plus three nights a week riding for four hours a night on a beat with an experienced officer, a total of 52 hours a week in rookie school.

In addition there are 24 required hours of Police Science at WSU, six hours a semester for two years. After that, once every two years, the officers must come back for a week's retraining to bring them up to date on police tactics.

Police fundamentals, special investigations, personal identification, and criminal law are part of the curriculum.

Officers who perform out-

standing service are recognized with gold or bronze badge awards. Each month an officer is picked from each department if this service has occurred and their name is submitted to a committee who selects one for the honor.

The award winner is honored at a luncheon and presented the badge by Chief of Police Eugene M. Pond. He also is presented at the Chamber of Commerce luncheon for further recognition.

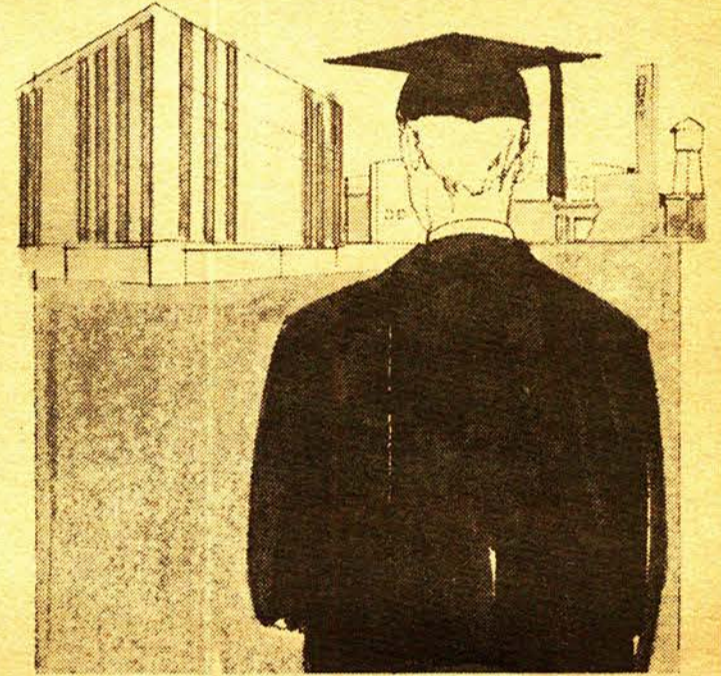

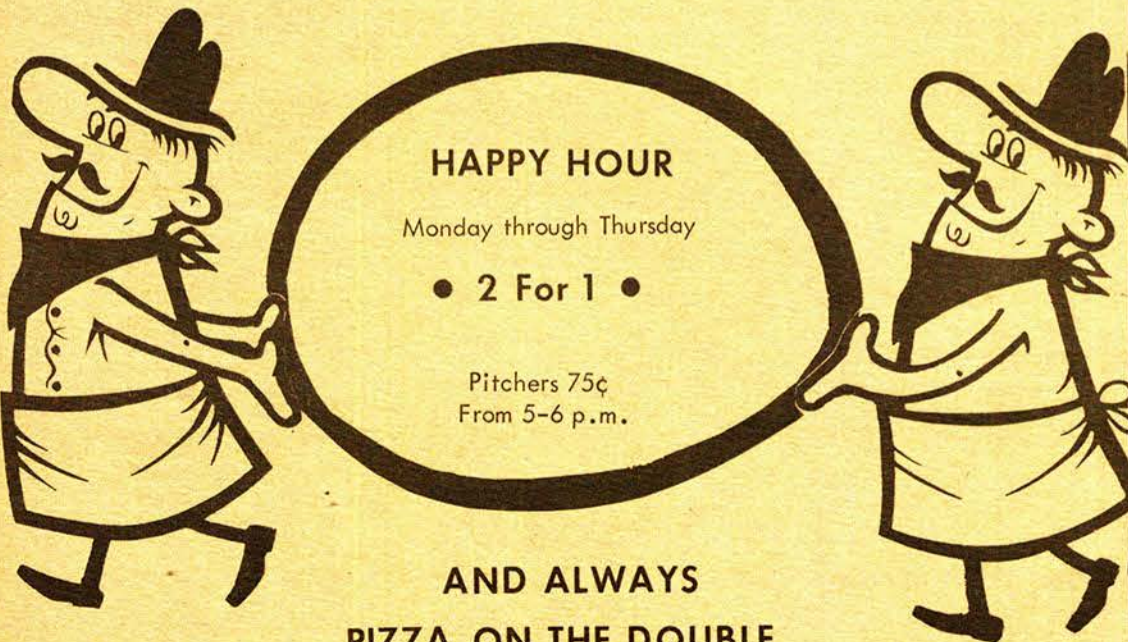

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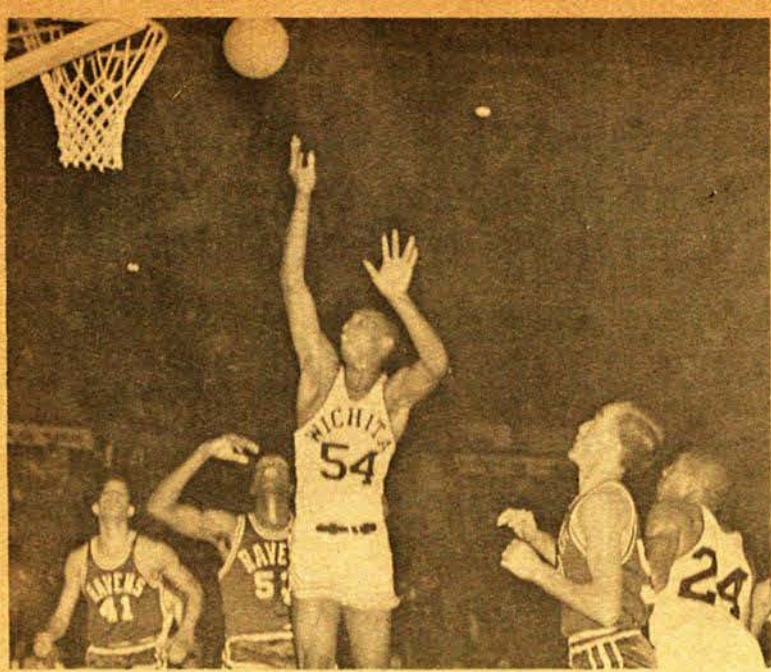

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Simmy Hill Against Coffeyville.

Hill Paces Frosh Quintet With 32.3 Points Per Game

Simmy Hill, 6-foot-8 frosh from Midland High School, Midland, Pa., is currently pacing the freshman team with a 32.3 scoring average and 10.3 rebounds a game after three freshman contests.

After three successful games, the Baby Shocks averaged 97.3 points per outing.

Hill was hitting at a .558 clip and 43 out of 77 field goal attempts from the field and has 11-15 from the charity stripe for a .733 percentage.

He ranks second in rebounds with 31 and first in total points with 97.

With the exception of Lew Alcindorx, a freshman at UCLA and ranked number one in the

country, Simmy Hill is probably the best freshman basketball player around.

His coaches feel that he is one of the most complete 6-foot-8 215 pound player they have seen. He is a good jumper and should give Wichita a possible two super starts, Armstrong and now Hill.

Ron Heller, freshman coach from McKeesport, Pa., was instrumental in recruiting Hill.

He has a long list of high school accomplishments to speak for his abilities. Among them are: All-State selection, junior and senior year; All-American, senior year; 26 point per game average; 20 rebounds per game; and led his team to a State Championship.

His high school team sported a 22-3 record his sophomore year, 25-1 his junior year and a 24-2 slate as a senior.

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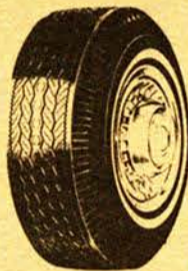
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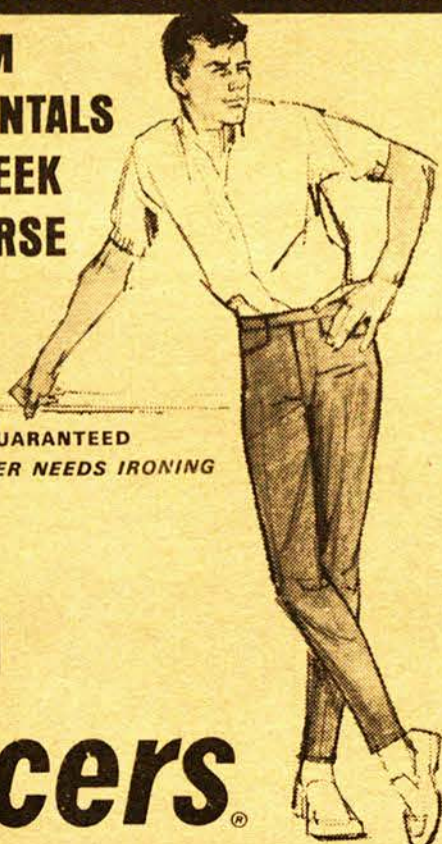
