DELEGATES GIVE REPORTS TO THE MILWAUKEE MEET

National Student Conference Is Reported on by Students in Wednesday's Chapel

Wednesday's chapel was in charge of the Wichita University students who were delegates to the student conference at Milwaukee which was held in December and was attended by over three thousand student representatives.

Willie Madge Bryant led the devotionals, using the services which were used at the opening convocation of the conference at Milwaukee. Miss Bryant spoke of the types of students who attended as they were divided into six groups by Bruce Curry of New York City, whose address opened the conference. The first type he described as one who was somewhat ashamed to be there, the second as one who was clutching at this conference as the last straw in the means of salvation, the third as one of radical beliefs and actions, the fourth as a student who was quiet and maybe didn't know just what he did believe, the fifth as a moderately religious person, and the sixth as one who had not found the secret drive for religion.

The session as a whole was divided into four great cycles, upon which men and women of note spoke. The first cycle was headed "Can God Be Accessible?", the second "International Relations" and "Inter-racial Problems", the third "Possibilities of Human Life", and the fourth "The Meaning of Christ Today".

Edna Nickel spoke of the deep impression left by Sir Studdert Kennedy of England, the personal chaplain to the King. Miss Nickel's subject was "This Drama Called Life" upon which Sir Kennedy had spoken. The theme of this drama of life was Christ, and the four scenes were the Birth, Crucifixion, Resurrection and Ascension.

Frost Tinkelpaugh outlined briefly the attitude of the conference upon international relations and the race problems. "The people of the United States are pioneers of country building and have spent very little time upon reflective thought and philosophical study," he said. "We regard the world as a place for our financial interests and in return for the influence we give we should not be prejudiced to that given to us in return. Everyone is struggling for ideal circumstances which can not be attained until the racial problem is settled," Mr. Tinkelpaugh declared.

Mordecai Johnston, a speaker at the conference, classifies the possibility of betterment into four parts, attempt to emancipate the negro, attempt to improve relations of this country with that of South America, China and Japan, co-operation with the countries of the world as a whole and to adopt the policy of non-violence.

Gwen Graham spoke upon the love of "High Powered Things" and pointed out that in our greed and ability to see power we forget the real things in life.

Ed Titt and Archie Booth were also members of the university student body who were in attendance at Milwaukee, but their speeches were postponed until a later date.

New Rules Made On Cuts and Failures

Students Failing to Make Required Hours Will Be Dropped from School

Prof. W. H. Mikesell, dean of the College of Liberal Arts, made official announcements in chapel, Wednesday, Jan. 5, regarding students in his departments.

No cuts will be allowed next semester. The faculty decided that if an absence was not excusable that it should not be allowed. Unexcused absences lower the grade and the dockage is left to the individual teachers. A new system of absences slips has been arranged which eliminates the extra processes which are now in use. These rules become effective the second semester.

The rules regarding failure are as follows:

Any first year student failing to receive credit for at least eight semester hours at the end of an semester shall be dropped from the University for the following semester.

Any first year student failing to the end of any semester to receive credit for at least eleven hours shall be placed upon probation for the following semester.

Failure of any first year student while under probation to pass 11 semester hours at the end of this semester shall exclude the student from the University for the following semester.

Any first year student electing eight hours or less must receive a grade other than F in all work taken or be dropped from the University for the following semester, unless allowed to continue by special action of the faculty.

Any student who has been in attendance at this institution or at any other college or university for one year or more who fails, at the end of any semester, to receive credit for 11 semester hours, shall be dropped from the University for the following semester, unless allowed to continue by special action of faculty.

REGISTRATION IS TO BE CONDUCTED UNDER NEW PLAN

Plans are Announced for Registration and Making of Schedules

January 31 is Registration Day. The student will pay his fee at the Bursar's office and in return receive a block of course cards across the top of which will be written the prescribed courses, penalties and special privileges for students. For instance students receiving only a D average will be allowed to take only 12 hours; those whose average is B or over will be permitted to take over 16 hours but not more than 18 which is granted by special permission of the Council which consists of the President and the Deans of the Colleges.

The student will then go to the gym and be directed by Major Grant or one of his assistants to his advisor. The advisor will make out the schedule and O. K. the slip. This slip is taken to the individual instructors who will O. K. the subject he will teach. The student goes then to the transcript table where it will be checked off to see that all signatures of the instructors are there. Then the schedule is copied on the final cards which are taken to the Dean of the College for his final signature.

Each individual instructor will have a long slip for his class roll so that he will know exactly the number in the class and when it is filled.

The Juniors and Seniors who have worked out their schedules with their Major advisors will simply have to pay the fee and merely have courses approved. The upperclassmen who have not already seen their Major Advisors are urged to do so at once. Those advisors make out schedule also for minors and electives.

LETTERS WILL BE GIVEN MEMBERS OF DEBATE TEAMS

Student Council Votes to Give Awards to Members of Forensic Teams—Petition Faculty for Scholastic Credit for Debaters

In recognition of services in forensics, letters will be given to members of the men's and women's debate teams, by the Student Council, according to action taken by that body in its regular meeting Monday night. A petition is being presented to the administration, asking for scholastic credit to be given to members of these teams.

In order to win this award, it is necessary to participate in a full season of debates. The alternates on the squad, who participate in a reasonable number of debates, and who follow the work carefully through the season, will be able to receive the letter and credit. The letters will be similar to those awarded to members of the band and glee club, and will be designed by the art class.

The revision of the Honor System was discussed, and three changes were suggested. These were: 1. To repeal the article providing for special proctors to be appointed in extreme cases. 2. To repeal the present method of turning in names, by means of sealed report, signed by two witnesses. 3. To change the personnel of the court to include a member from each society. These were merely offered as possible changes, and the members of the council were asked to consider them and discuss them in various groups in order to be prepared to vote on them at the next meeting. It is hoped that by that time there will be other suggestions for improvement.

The present Honor System will be in effect during the final examinations and until the council changes the system.

A petition to keep the library open on Saturdays from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m., and on Sunday from 1 p. m. to 6 p. m. was drawn up by the council and presented to the faculty.

Students to Fill Parts In Drama

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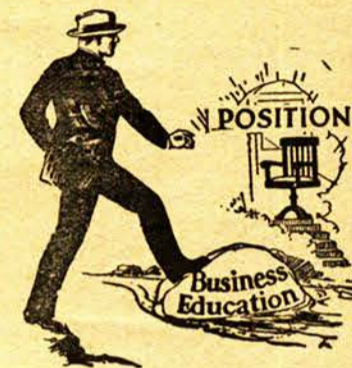
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Shockers Defeat St. Mary's Quintet

The Wichita University five, led by Captain Davis, overpowered the Irish on their own court Tuesday evening, by a score of 33-25.

The game started, both teams held a steady defense, as a result neither team scored during the first six minutes of play. McBurney started the Wichita offense to functioning when he slipped in a short one, Reynolds then followed with another, giving Davie's men a 4-0 lead. St. Mary's came back strong with Morrissey sinking a couple of nice shots, tying up the score. This outburst of the enemy's only seemed to start the Wichita five on their way to victory. The offense of the Shockers broke out and completely overpowered the Irish with its speed.

McBurney seemed to play the center cog of the local machine in fine shape, following up the shots and tipping in four of them, also shooting a nice one from the side of the court. Captain Davis shared high point honors with Morrissey, St. Mary's only man who could find the hoop to any degree of accuracy. Reynolds played a fast game, with excellent floor work, adding four baskets to the local score.

The second half was a fast one, Captain Davis, standing out as the star of the game until he was kneed in the back by one of the St. Mary's players and had to be taken from the game. The game ended with the local leading with the score of 33-25.

DeVone Quinn, handled the character of the Soviet detective admirably, as he did also the parts of the wily leader of the pirate mutiny, and that of Jim Fleming, the master crook.
