

Hornets Try To Take Sixth Victory Here

Strong Emporia Team Has Impressive Record

Boasting a record of five wins out of eight starts, four of which were by large margins, the Hornets of Emporia Teachers will attempt to sting the Wheatshockers into submission when the two teams meet at Shocker Stadium Saturday afternoon.

With a tough eleven-game schedule, the Hornets have thus far established a creditable record. Such a schedule is bound to be a gruelling one, and the fact that the Emporians have shown up so well is indicative of their strength.

Emporia Wins Five

Coach Fran Welch's charges have to their credit wins over McPherson, Washburn, Southwestern, Haskell, and the Superior, Wis., Teachers. On the opposite side of the column are losses to Edmund Teachers, the powerful St. Benedict's, and Fort Hays. In last year's game here, Emporia was defeated 14 to 7.

A perusal of the Central Conference standings shows the Emporians in possession of third place. Should Wichita win Saturday, they have a mathematical chance of shoving the Hornets down into fourth place, the position which they occupied last year. By taking this and the remainder of their conference games, the Wheatshockers would be able to come out with about an even break in games won and lost in the conference, so a lot of action from both teams may well be expected.

Hornet Line-Up Intact

After coming through last week's game with no serious injuries, the Hornets are expected to start the same men Saturday who were in the opening line-up against the Superior Teachers. This roster would see Daniel at left end and Kline at right end. In Kline, the Emporians have a fine pass-snagger, as well as one of the best kickers in the conference. He weighs 180 pounds, and is a power defensively.

At right tackle will be Strube, co-captain, and one of the few veterans on the squad. Tony Lohkamp, left tackle, who won his freshman numeral at Notre Dame last year, and since transferring to the Emporia school, has been going in pleasing style. Harry Parker, who won his spurs last year as a freshman, will be at left guard, while Smith will likely get the call on the right side of the line at guard, and Goldsmith will be at the center position.

Petty Is Speedy

In the backfield, Meats will hold down the signal-barker's post. This man is the lightest regular on the squad, weighing but 143 pounds, but he holds his place by virtue of his speed and courage. At left half will be "Buck" King, who was a shining light in the Washburn game. Lindell Petty, speed merchant, will probably see service at this position. Lett, a converted fullback, will likely get the call at right half.

Shocker Starters Uncertain

The Wheatshocker line-up is undecided as yet, but likely will see Nye and Harrell or Stewart at ends, Heisen and Elkermann at tackles, Ax and Fulton at guards, Nash at center, Ogden at quarter, Wells and Brill, halves, and Niegage or Ward at full.

Hockey Teams Are Paired in Tourney

With the girls' varsity hockey team to be announced at the end of this week, the interclass hockey tournament has been progressing, and other games have been announced.

In the coming matches, the freshmen are to play the sophomores Friday afternoon, and the junior-senior team, Monday afternoon. Saturday morning a game between the Wichita Hockey Club and the freshmen team is scheduled.

Plans for the alumnae, varsity match, which is to be played Nov. 16, in connection with Homecoming, are not yet complete. In the games played last week, the sophomore team beat the junior-senior team 2-0.

Hays-Pitt Game Holds Present C. C. Interest

Undeclared Teams Clash At Pittsburg Saturday

With undisputed possession of first place in the Central Conference going to the victor, the Pittsburg-Fort Hays clash at Pittsburg will hold the league's spotlight this week.

When the Gorillas sprang their astounding victory over the Wheatshockers last week, they immediately sky-rocketed into a position of power in the conference along with the Tigers. Pittsburg is now turning on the heat, following her poor early-season showing. Tomorrow's fracas will afford them the opportunity of overtaking and passing the first place Tigers.

Emporia Teachers upheld the Central Conference standard of football, by obliterating a Superior, Wis., Teachers' team, 26-7, while Hays marched on in their victory parade, downing a stubborn Haskell Indian team, 14-0.

The luckless Moundbuilders of Southwestern suffered another defeat, their sixth in seven starts, when the Bacone Indians nosed them out, 6-0.

The game here Saturday, between the Shockers and Emporia Teachers, will command its share of attention. The Gebert-men have a chance for at least a third-place tie if they defeat the Hornets.

Neely Assists Cage Direction

Pre-season basketball practice is progressing with sessions being held three times weekly. Coach Bill Hennigh is conducting scrimmages between the freshmen and those eligible for varsity competition with LeRoy Neely assisting as frosh coach.

A cut was made last week which left only 21 men on the two squads; 12 varsity men and 9 frosh. Positions seem to be well filled with at least three men competing for each post on the varsity. Lettermen are at a premium with none out for the varsity at present. Six lettermen are grid players.

Cal Stewart and "Big" Elkermann, Shocker linemen, both lettered last year and are expected to fill the pivot position. Two flashy veterans, "Pike" Gawthrop and Wayne Johnson will fill the forward positions with Cupit, Jim Armour, Barner, Jacques, and Bill Price on the reserves.

Two able veteran guards have returned this season in Glenn Nye and Ray DeHon, who were powerful Shocker defensive men last season. Earl Jones, Strahan, Jackson and Lester will also be eligible to fill in at guard.

The freshmen squad is composed of Plab, Glenn, Cope, Radcliff, Dennison, Allen, Kice, Curry and Wren. Several frosh are expected to report after termination of the freshmen football schedule.

Wichita Loses For Fourth Time

Pitt Remains Undeclared In Conference Play

Losing to a team they outplayed in many departments, Wichita's Shockers lost to Pittsburg last Saturday, 7 to 0, leaving the Gorillas' conference record still unmarred.

The Wichita team nearly tripled the number of first downs that the Pittsburg team made; yet they lacked the necessary drive to carry the ball across the opponents' goal. Twice the Shockers were inside the Pittsburg 25-yard line but failed to score as a result of fumbles and penalties.

Pittsburg's only score came early in the second period when Gibson, taking the ball on a spinner play through the left side of his own line, raced 54 yards, untouched, for the lone touchdown. Fahnrburch made good his try for point.

Delfon and Brill led the Shocker offense, with their running and passing while Gibson was outstanding for Pittsburg. Wichita's best play was demonstrated on their end run lateral plays, but they were unable to capitalize for scores.

Yearlings To Meet Ichabod Freshmen

After winning their first game from Sterling 14 to 0, the Shocker freshmen will travel to Topeka for a game with the Washburn freshmen, Saturday afternoon.

The Sterling game was played in a bitter raw wind which was a hindrance to good performances. In spite of this, both of the freshmen scores were made as the direct result of passes as well as the Sterling touchdown, which was made from a pass over the goal line.

Sterling was completely outplayed by the freshmen, both offensively and defensively, with the ball lugging of Kenneth LaFever, Cleal LaFever, and Dial outstanding for Wichita. In the line Paul Nye and Stewart, playing wing positions, performed well.

Penalties were frequent, especially against the frosh who drew an even hundred yards, compared with five yards for Sterling. In spite of this, Sterling was outgained in total yardage three-fold.

Saturday's game at Topeka will close the playing season for the Wichita freshmen.
