

Pitt to Bring Strong Team to Meet Shockers on Saturday

The Shockers' first home conference game brings Pittsburg Teachers, one of the Central's toughest teams, to Wichita Saturday for a game which may determine the Shockers' chances in the conference race.

Indications from the Pittsburg camp are that the Gorillas are pointing for a victory over Wichita after being stopped last week by Fort Hays State, in a game which Coach Blue Howell's Gorillas dominated most of the way.

Statistics indicate the Shockers will go into the game as overwhelming favorites, since Pittsburg has been unsuccessful in five games this season. Statistics show that the Gorillas have won every other year, and this is Wichita's year.

Another indication of victory for the Shockers is the fact that in the last six years the records show that the teams have won every other year, and this is Wichita's year.


