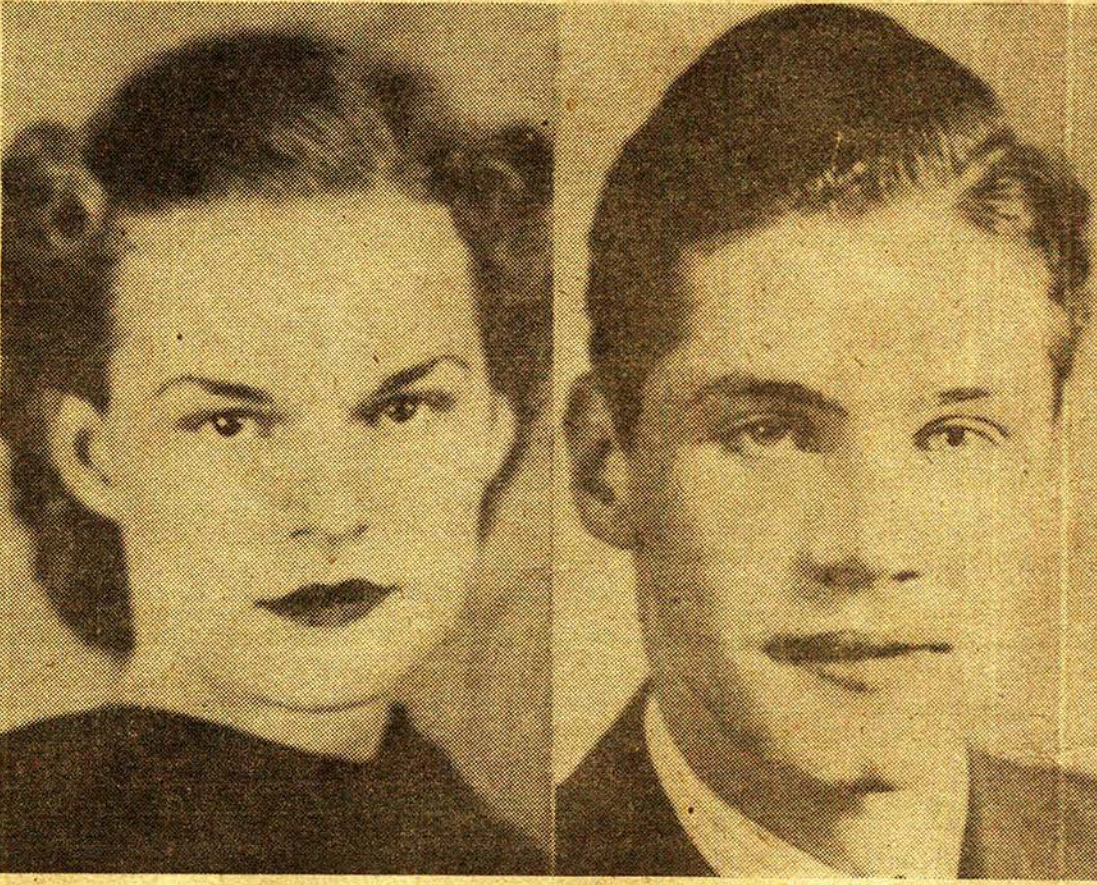

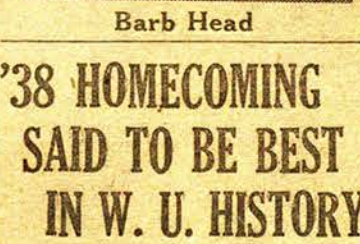

Motion Picture Industry Can Further Democracy

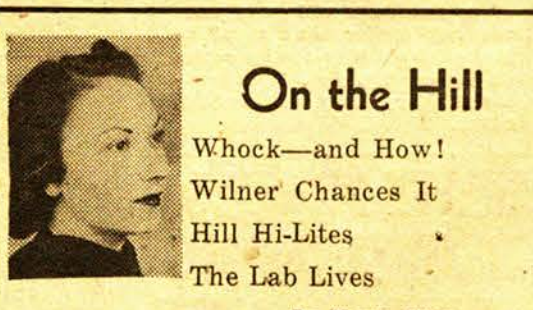

MILITARY Ball regulations have been changed. Now any student at the University will be admitted to the gala affair. All he has to do is sign his, and his guest's name at the military office in Fiske Hall. Heretofore, only one civilian guest was allowed each R. O. T. C. member.

SHOCKERS WALLOP EMPORIA 26-6 AT HOMECOMING GAME

Spectacular Play and Colorful Ceremony Brings Enthusiastic Reception from Crowded Stands; Shockers Show Precision

In winning their Homecoming game with Emporia State, 26-6 Saturday afternoon, the Shockers also repeated their conference championship with an undefeated record that is two seasons old.

Although the Emporia Hornets gave the Shockers more competition than any other conference opponent, Wichita was never in great danger. The Hornets had many successes in mid-field play, but were held on all but one occasion when they penetrated deep into Wichita territory.

With the game only a few seconds old the Emporians uncorked a goalward drive with a series of baffling spinners and reverses that carried them to within the shadow of the Shockers goal line.

Hornets Display Speed Behind a fairly light line, the Hornets had an array of speedy backs that handled the ball well. Their passing attack, although highly rated, was of no use against the Shocker defense, which was bulwarked by the return of Reiny Niehage to the Shocker backfield.

The Emporia touchdown was the second in two seasons of conference play that has been scored on the Shockers. The other counter was made by Fort Hays last week. In the last two seasons the Shockers have scored 104 points, against conference foes, while their opponents have scored but 13 points.

Smith Prepares Stage Tromer Smith, again set the stage for the Wichitans' first score when he galloped from near the midfield stripe to within ten yards of the goal line. Harold Brill starred more as a passer than in his usual role as a ball carrier. Many of the Wichita gains were made through the air with Dave Johnson doing most of the snagging.

The game Saturday was the fifth victory this season for the Shockers. They have been beaten twice, tied once, and two games remain on the schedule.

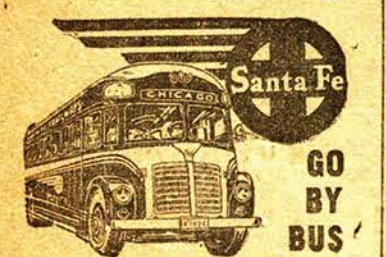

Southwestern, the winless cellar squad, meets up with Fort Hays this Saturday for the only conference encounter of the week-end.

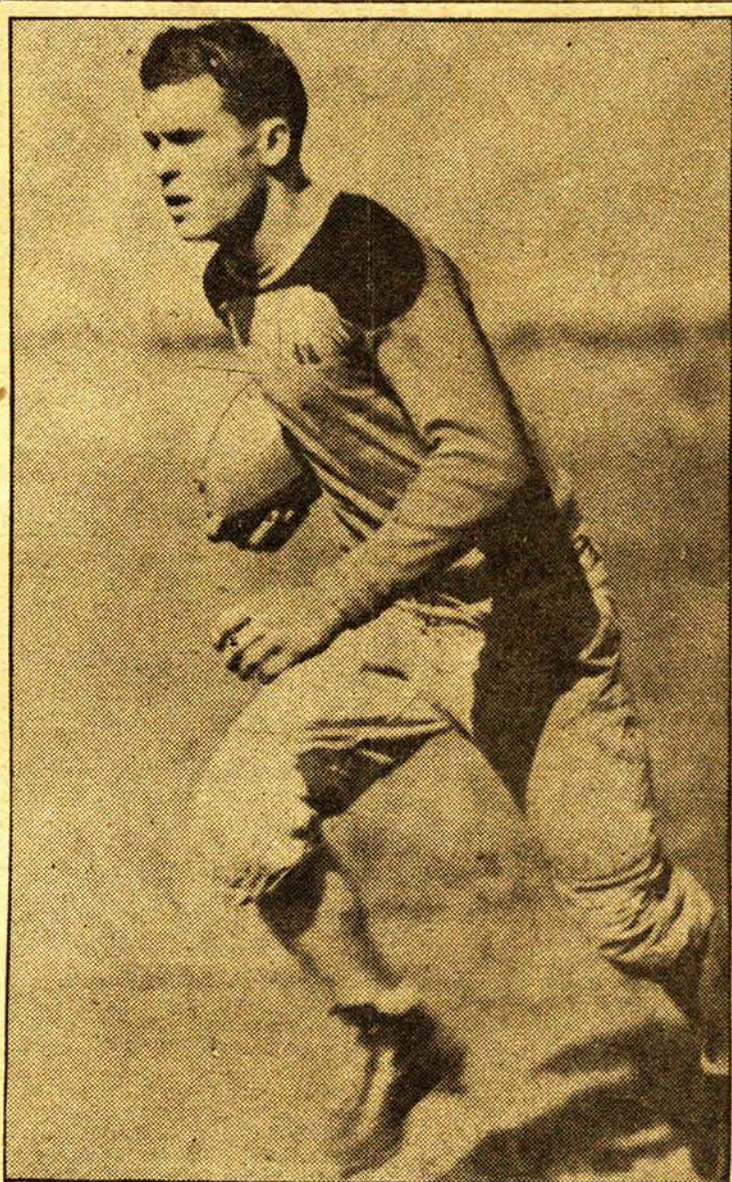

Cowpunchers Have Lost Two Valley Games This Season

Aggies Beat OCU The Aggies have not been impressive this year, but last week they won from Oklahoma City University and should come back strong this week. Both Washburn and Creighton, who have played Wichita this year, won over the Sooners and this should give Wichita some satisfaction.

After the fine pass offense that the Shockers displayed against Emporia State, Al Gebert, has indicated that he may depend much on the aerial route in planning the attack against Oklahoma A. and M. In the Emporia game the Shockers completed 10 out of 16 passes. Most of them were for long gains and two went for touchdowns.

Aggies Have Big Squad With 23 lettermen returning to school this fall, the Aggies have a strong squad, although their record of games won is not high. Ted Cox, head coach at Stillwater, employs the Minnesota system, which he learned while playing varsity football at Minnesota.

The Minnesota system, which is run off a single wing-back, is well suited to spinners and wide end runs. The Cowpunchers have fast backs who usually run the ends for consistent gains.

The game will give the Shockers a chance to put the final touch on one of their most successful seasons. If they can win from the Cowpunchers Saturday, they will have a season record of two losses.
