Word has been received from Emporia that neither the school gym nor Union Building there will be available for a Wichita Victory Varsity, although arrangements had been made three weeks in advance. No reason was given for the announcement. Since the Board of Deans will not permit a dance away from the Emporia campus, the Student Council has provided that the special train leave Emporia at 7 p. m. in order that students may return in time to stage a Victory Varsity in Henrion Gymnasium, according to Ross Denison, council president. Dancing will last from 10 till 12 p. m.

Shocker rooters will leave Wichita Saturday morning at 9:55 o'clock for Emporia, on their annual booster trip. The Shocker-Hornet game is to hold the spotlight of the day. Approximately 450 students are expected to buy tickets for the trip within the next two days, according to Ross Denison, president of the Student Council.

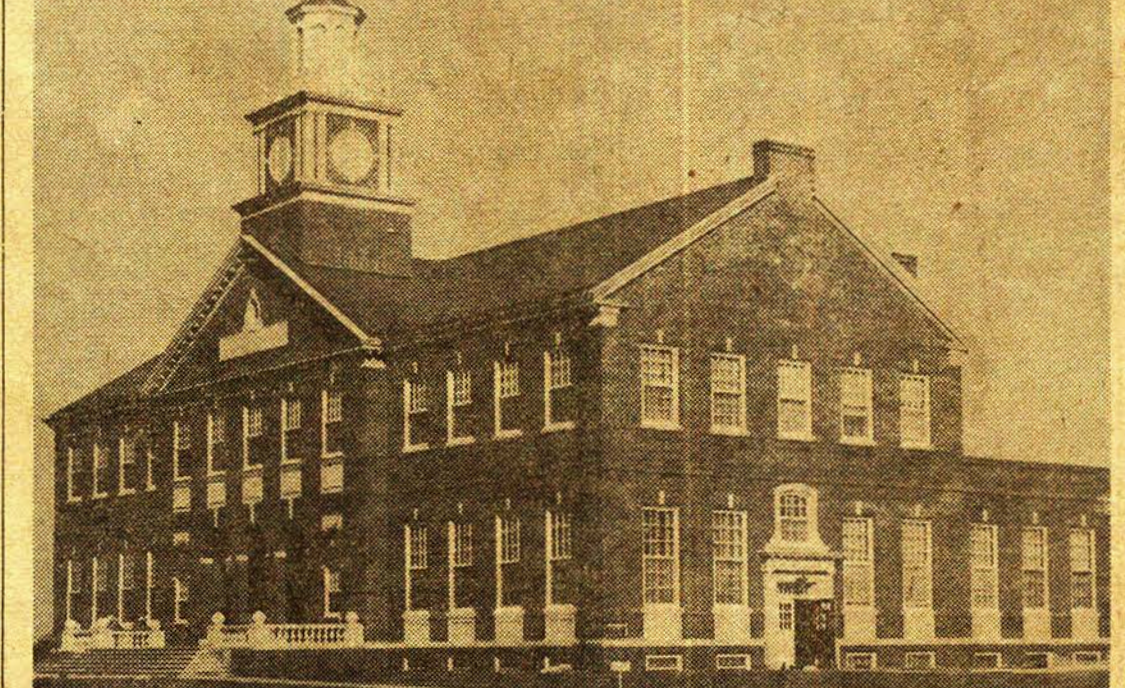

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You—And Sudden Death

IT IS HOPED that the students who read this will absorb its contents and those driving to Emporia this week-end will think of it and be aware of the possibilities of danger on the highway going to and from the Shocker-Hornet football game.

Paradoxical as it may seem, publicizing the total of motoring injuries—almost a million last year, with 36,000 deaths—never gets to first base in jarring the motorist into a realization of the appalling risks of motoring.

Figures exclude the pain and horror of savage mutilation. A passing look at a bad smash or the news that a fellow you had lunch with last week is in a hospital with a broken back will make any driver but a born fool slow down at least temporarily.

The automobile is treacherous, just as a wildcat is. It is tragically difficult to realize that it can become the deadliest of missiles.

Take a look at yourself as the man in the white jacket shakes his head over you, tells the boys with the stretcher not to bother, and turns away to somebody else who isn't quite dead yet. AND THEN TAKE IT EASY.

America CAN Stay Out

ERNEST K. LINDLEY, former Kansan and well-known Washington correspondent, told the Topeka Chamber of Commerce last week that there has been an "almost miraculous" swing in public opinion in the East toward the view that the United States can stay out of the European war.

It is very encouraging for us here in the Middle West to know that as the first nine weeks of the second World War become an event of the past, we are farther from the firing line than we were at the beginning.

Overwhelmingly, public opinion declares, "We don't want war!" All that remains for us, then, is to substitute faith for fatalism, as our fellow citizens in the East are doing, and maintain determinedly that we will hold off not for six months, or a year, but for as long as the war can possibly last.

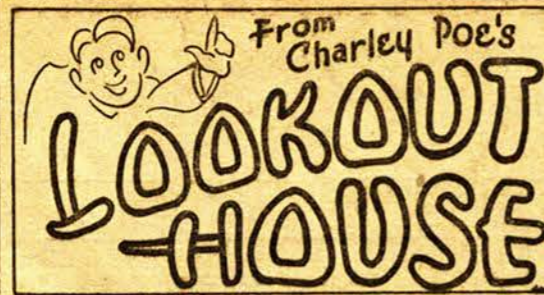
Defense of Our Band

New University Library Still Is Known as Morrison

Name Chiseled Above Entrance of New Building Designates It as the Campus Library

SINCE classes first convened this fall the object of many campus conversations has been the new \$160,000 library building into which most of the University's books now have been transferred.

One person has asked another, "What will they call it? Will it be a new Morrison Library or will it receive the unattached title of University Library?"

Those questions have been answered in a compromising way. High above the entrance carved in the stone is the title "University Library." This name designates it as the campus library, constructed jointly by the University with the help of WPA funds.

As the lone survivor of Fairmount Institute's first Board of Trustees, Dr. Walter Graves, 79, is quick to give his opinion regarding any possible change in the name of the collection.

Dr. Graves, one of seven trustees for Fairmount Institute, is sincere in what he says. Living at the Wichita Masonic Home, his slight failing, yet apparently in complete accord with the many advances at the school he helped foster, he reminded his interviewer that "stone and mortar do not make a library."

Back of the parade of progress which has led thousands of University volumes into a great new protective structure is an enticing story. It is the story of the origin of this collection—one of the most complete of its kind in the South and Midwest.

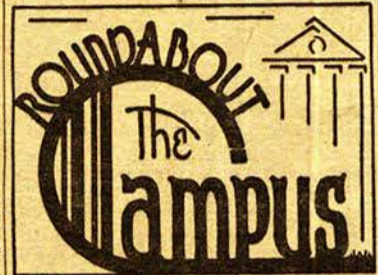

WICHITA JOURNEYS TO EMPORIA FIELD FOR C. I. C. BATTLE

Central Conference Title May Be Decided by Outcome of W. U.-Emporia Tilt; Free Scoring Game Expected

With the two high scoring teams of the Central Conference meeting this Saturday, the Wichita-Emporia Teachers grid tilt may be the game that will definitely decide the Conference crown.

With Emporia boasting one of the highest scoring teams in the state, and yet only leading Wichita by 12 points in Central Conference scoring so far this season, the game Saturday is expected to be a free scoring affair. Emporia has scored 77 points in Conference play thus far this season, with 12 points against them. Wichita has collected 65 points against the opposition's 6 centers.

Both Look Impressive
Last week both teams looked impressive with wins. Emporia beat their city rivals, the College of Emporia, by a score of 59 to 7, which averages about a point a minute. Wichita, snapping a scoreless streak of three straight games, showed real scoring punch under the power of Coach Al Gebert's sophomore backs when they defeated St. Benedict's, 33 to 6.

While Emporia has one defeat in Conference play, losing to St. Benedict's, their offensive power is growing stronger with each remaining game. This week's clash will prove whether the victory over St. Benedict's by the Shockers was an upset or the logical result of the better team winning, in the opinion of many local sports experts.

It Is Probable
If the Hornets should beat Wichita in the clash at Emporia, the possibility of a three-way tie for first place by St. Benedict's, Wichita, and Emporia is quite probable. A win for the Shockers, however, would give W. U. a dominating bid for a repeat on the Central Conference crown.

Emporia has a well-balanced team with a strong line, and her backfield is filled with capable runners. Caywood, left half, is a triple-threat man for the Hornets, and he proved himself as such by scoring 33 of his teams' 59 points against the College of Emporia last week. George and Ireland are two more backs that have scored frequently throughout the season for Emporia.

Gebert Is Pleased
Coach Al Gebert was naturally well-pleased with his team's performance against the Ravens, but he has a lot of respect for the Emporia club and a hard battle is expected. The rivalry between these two schools is considered the keener of the Conference, since every year finds Emporia and Wichita having tough grid battles.

ing Western town. A depression worse, but not so general as the present, had hit the southwest and thousands had moved from the city. The Wichita Eagle published an editorial requesting citizens to build up their board walks and paint their buildings. Kansas joined the Populist movement, as thousands of mortgages were foreclosed, Eastern interests lost on investments and became embittered against the state.

Thus, in brief, the old trustee narrates the plight of the city. Meanwhile the college was having worries, too. It needed endowments to keep it in operation; to finish the still incomplete Fairmount Hall; to purchase books for a better library. The Congregational Educational Society had heretofore followed a policy of supporting only one college in a state. Therefore, according to Dr. Graves, Washburn, the first school of the denomination, waged relentless war upon its new rival.

The last touchdown was again smashed through by Hayes from the three-yard line in the same third quarter, and this time Oric Neely's kick for the extra point was no good.

The Ravens score came in the last quarter on a long pass from Andrews to Donahue, who caught the ball on the Shockers' 35-yard line and raced across the goal. Wichita was again hampered by several penalties and fumbles, but play generally by the team was good.

Michigan, which was a candidate for the mythical national championship of football, had its mind changed last Saturday by the fighting Illinois by a score of 16 to 7. Tom Harmon, a second Red Grange, was unable to do much against Illinois, and therefore Michigan took the biggest upset of the week.
