



Definite assurance that the present wooden stands on the east side of the football field will be removed, probably some time during the month of December, was given yesterday by Walter Henrion, chairman of the building and grounds committee of the Board of Regents and head of a recently appointed commit-tee to study seating conditions. "This is the last year for the

wooden stands," Mr. Henrion said. "Although no formal ac-tion has been taken regarding tearing down the present structure, I personally can see noth-ing but concrete for the new section of the stadium.

"I think it is plain that we need a new seating arrangement. I am for it, and I think the board is for it. As soon as it is practical I will try to get the committee members together to devise some means of solving the financing question, which is the main obstruction at present. Nothing will be done until after Dec. 1, however."
