Classes Get Underway Tomorrow

Registration Figures Are Expected to Equal Last Semester's High

Second semester classes will be tomorrow as scheduled, following a week of student enrollment and pre-semester preparation with another record enrollment expected when final figures are released.

Enrollment, which began Monday and continued through yesterday, saw more than 950 students through the lines the first time when the final count is tab-

Results of New Registration Plan Will Be Known Today

Success of the new plan of registration inaugurated this week by the University and devised for the elimination of overcrowded classes and discriminations will be known today at 5 p. m. when the last student completes his enrollment.

University officials were faced with the largest enrollment in history last semester and saw, along with the students, the many faults of the old system. With prospects of an even greater number of students in the second term, the difficult task of working out a new system fell upon the curriculum and schedule committee headed by Dr. Lloyd McKinley.

In working out the system the committee was instructed by Dr. W. M. Jardine, president of the University, to uphold the quality of classroom instruction. Keeping this in mind the committee decided upon a plan of limiting enrollment in classes according to the capacity of the plant.

Each department head was consulted as to the number of students that should be handled in each class maintaining the quality of instruction. Certain departments were specific in limiting enrollment to their classes while others agreed to accept as many students as could be seated in the classroom.

To facilitate the limiting of class enrollment students were introduced during the last three days to an innovation known as the class card which was adopted by the committee. If a section of freshman English had limited the class to 30 students, only 30 class cards were available. When these 30 cards were distributed students found that the class was closed.

Two alternatives were left to the student. Either he had to change his class to another hour or he had to consult the schedule adjuster who attempted to work out a schedule covering the same courses as was recommended by errands were taken to the business office by messengers. Arnall, Fresh From Bitter Georgia Political Fight, Speaks Here Wednesday

Foe of KKK and White Supremacy to Deliver Address on 'Whose Country Is This, Anyway?' At East High School; W.U. Forum is Sponsor

Ellis Arnall, who last week relinquished his claim to the bitterly-disputed governorship of Georgia, will bring national attention to the University Student Forum under whose sponsorship he will speak in the East High School Auditorium at 8:30 p. m. next Wednesday.

TWA Official Joins Staff

Appointment of Garland T. Scott, former head statistician in traffic and senior staff assistant in air world education with Trans World Airlines as professor of aeronautical administration is announced today by University officials.

Scott is a graduate of the University of Missouri where he also received his master's degree. He was superintendent of schools at Blue Springs, Mo., for five years and spent two and one half years in the Army Air Corps in charge of weights and balances at Hamilton Field, Calif.

In addition to aeronautical work, Scott also will instruct in marketing, business organization and management and salesmanship. The Scotts come here from Kansas City, Mo. They reside now at 2909 Shadybrook.

Acknowledged by forum officials as the most newsworthy figure to appear on a forum program in its 10-year history, Arnall is expected to draw a capacity house. Students will be admitted on their activity tickets and are urged to come early to assure themselves of a seat.

Arnall, at one time the nation's youngest governor, will speak on "Whose Country Is This, Anyway?"

Short, stocky 40-year-old Arnall has been in politics most of his life. He is a graduate of the University of the South and of the University of Georgia Law School.

Following a few years of law practice, he ran for the state House of Representatives, winning with a 10-to-1 majority over the combined votes of five opponents. From 1933 to 1937 he was speaker general. He was elected attorney general in 1939.

In 1943 Arnall defeated the red-galussed advocate of white supremacy, Eugene Talmadge, for the Georgia governorship.

During his term, Arnall attracted national attention by eliminating the poll tax, chain gang and by restoring Georgia's schools to accredited standing. He also removed many state boards from the governor's domination and sponsored a bill allowing 18-year-olds to vote. He long has been a bitter foe of the Ku Klux Klan.

When Governor-Elect Talmadge died last December, Arnall refused to relinquish the governorship to Talmadge's son, Herman, but acceded in favor of Lieutenant-Governor M. E. Thompson, until the courts can decide the issue.

The Wichita appearance may be his last before the court fight.

Wind Tunnel Is Moved

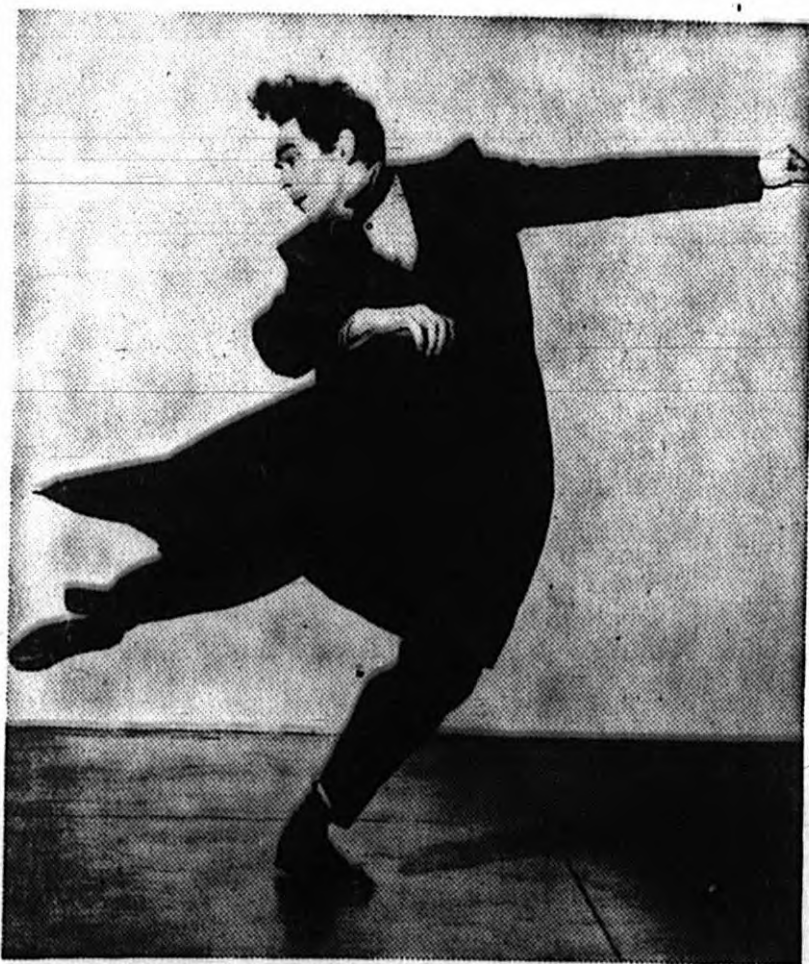
Removal of the University's wind tunnel to the new engineering building has now been completed, according to Kenneth Razak, head of the department of aeronautical engineering, who was in charge of the moving operation. Razak estimates that the wind tunnel will be ready for use in about three weeks.

The wind tunnel was moved in sections from its former location in the attic of the science building, and each section was replaced exactly in the new building. The tube, which is sixty-five feet long, was moved in four sections.

"One problem involved in the moving operation," Razak said, "is the reinstatement of balances and calibrations in the tunnel. Another is the transition from electric power to the gas engine which will provide the power for the tunnel in the future."

(5) Claims for disability compensation may be made at any time in the future, but an appeal from a decision of a rating board must be made within one year after notification of the decision. (6) Claims for payment for unused terminal leave by former enlisted personnel must be filed before Sept. 1, 1947.

NATIONAL Service Life Insurance should be reinstated before Feb. 1 if veterans want to take advantage of the waiver of the physical examination requirement. Policies may be reinstated by paying two months premium and filling out form 353A which may be obtained in Room 203 KFH Building, Veterans Administration Guidance Center at the University, or 3801 So. Oliver.

FOREIGN schools and college lists, approved by the Vets Administration, are now available at the VA Guidance Center. They include institutions in Canada, England, France, Italy, Switzerland, Australia, China, Mexico, Scotland, India, Belgium and Columbia. Veterans desiring to attend school in any of these countries should contact the VA Guidance Center for further information.

SUBSISTANCE increases are still rather touchy bits of legislation in Washington, D. C. It seems that all veterans organizations are favorable but each is afraid of definitely committing itself before it finds out the attitude of Congress. With all the talk of the drop of prices in the air, congressmen will probably be a bit skeptical of advocating an increase in subsistence.

DEADLINES that vets should keep in mind are: (1) Loans on homes, farms or businesses may be guaranteed or insured by the Vets Administration until 10 years after the official declaration of the end of World War II. (2) Education and training under terms of PL 346 (G. I. Bill) may be started within four years after the official end of the war, but must be completed within nine years of that date. (3) Disabled vets eligible for education of training under PL 16 must complete such training within nine years after the official end of the war, although they face no deadline on their entry into training.

OTHER deadlines include: (4) Unemployment or self-employment allowances may be applied for within two years after the official end of the war or two years after discharge, whichever is later, with an over-all limitation of five years after the ter-

School Will Conduct Research To Solve Problems of State

A comprehensive, long-range research program, covering over a period of the next several years problems of specific benefit to Kansas, will be underway soon at the University of Wichita Foundation for Industrial Research. Dr. Waldo B. Burnett, director, has announced.

The eight studies to be investigated, which are in addition to the projects sponsored by private industry, include those of a caustic soda industry, oil production methods, clay deposits, soil mechanics and stabilization, development of a low cost moisture meter, seed planting and metering mechanism, water proofing and radiant heating.

"Despite the improvements that have been made in oil production methods, a large percentage of the crude oil is still left in the ground and is not recoverable by present-day methods," Dr. Bennett said.

The study of soil mechanics and stabilizations, Dr. Bennett pointed out, will be of value from the viewpoint of constructing roads, air-

ports and railroads as well as foundations for buildings.

Farmers will be benefited primarily by the development of a low-cost moisture meter, the director said.

"Although there are a number of good moisture meters on the market there is a definite need for a simple, inexpensive moisture meter to be used by farmers and small grain dealers in checking the moisture content of grains and other agriculture products to determine their suitability for storage," Dr. Burnett declared.

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

Seven of the eight Sunflower staff members are war veterans.

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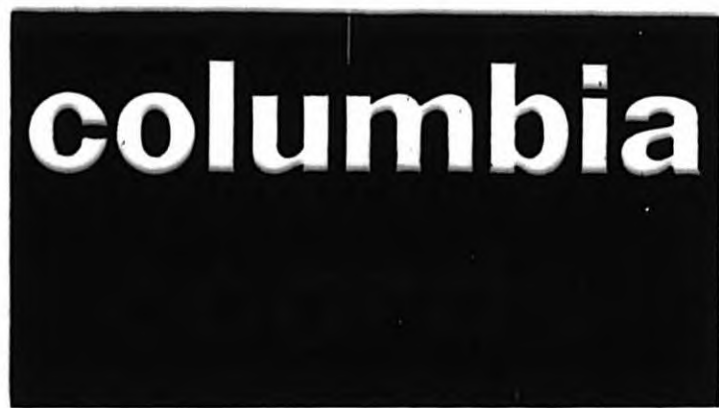

Harold Beal, Shocker forward, recovered his shooting eye and kept the W. U. men in the game, tallying five buckets and three free throws. Bob Rogers, Aggie forward, was leading scorer with 19 points.

The Shocker reserves lost to the Aggie frosh team, 28-22, after a heated battle all the way.

He has directed the play of the Wichita reserves while Assistant Coach Ted Warren has taken over the varsity squad due to the illness of Head Coach Mel Binford.



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

student came to the office to pay his bill, the cards were stamped "paid," and issued to the individual. (All cards must be paid for by next Monday or they will be returned to the Registrar for redistribution.) Veterans received their class cards upon completion of enrollment as the Veterans Administration bill clerk stamped the cards in the gymnasium.

The class card will be the ticket for admission to each course on the student's schedule. Only upon presentation of this card to the instructor can a student remain in the classroom and occupy a seat.

Class cards for each course, heavily in demand, were divided equally among the three days set aside for registration. If there were 30 cards available for the course, 10 cards were in the box

for names from A to G, 10 cards were reserved for names from H through O, and 10 cards set aside for names from P to Z. If any cards were left over from any of the days they were applied to the following day's quota.

Another innovation adopted by the committee with the approval of the bookstore was the representative in the gymnasium of the bookstore. This was done to eliminate the long lines of veteran and non-veteran students waiting to have their schedule fulfilled with the necessary books. The experienced representative made out a list for each student as required by his class cards. This made the task easier for the regular bookstore employee and also lessened the time of waiting in line for the student.

One of the major tasks facing the committee was to eliminate

charges that certain groups, such as the non-veteran and the working student, were being discriminated against. The charges were that these groups could not get morning classes or that they were forced to take courses which they did not want.

The committee was aware that the majority of students desired morning classes. The committee felt that everyone could be accommodated if the student body would accept afternoon classes. It was evident that even if the faculty were available for additional classes during the morning hours, those classes could not be opened unless facilities were available.

The capacity of the University plant is in full operation on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, but there will probably be some room available on Tuesday and Thursday," state Dr. Worth A. Fletcher, registrar.

Dr. McKinley and his committee, therefore, adopted what they felt the most fair basis for their new system, that was the "first come, first served" plan which has a chance to be the first one in line regardless of whether he is a veteran or non-veteran; working student or non-working student." There was no attempt by

the committee or the faculty to discriminate against any group, but instead, an attempt was made to put everyone on an even basis in rationing out a place to heavily demanded classrooms.

The committee during its many sessions studied many plans of other schools. A priority system according to scholastic standing is being used by Colorado College. At the University of Michigan, freshmen and sophomores are not given the opportunity of being counseled in making out their own schedule. Instead the student is given a schedule as prescribed by the curriculum for lower division work.

The University of Wichita has attempted to adopt a system which will maintain a high quality of instruction; will not discriminate against any certain group and eliminate overcrowded classrooms. The new system will not do away with standing in line.

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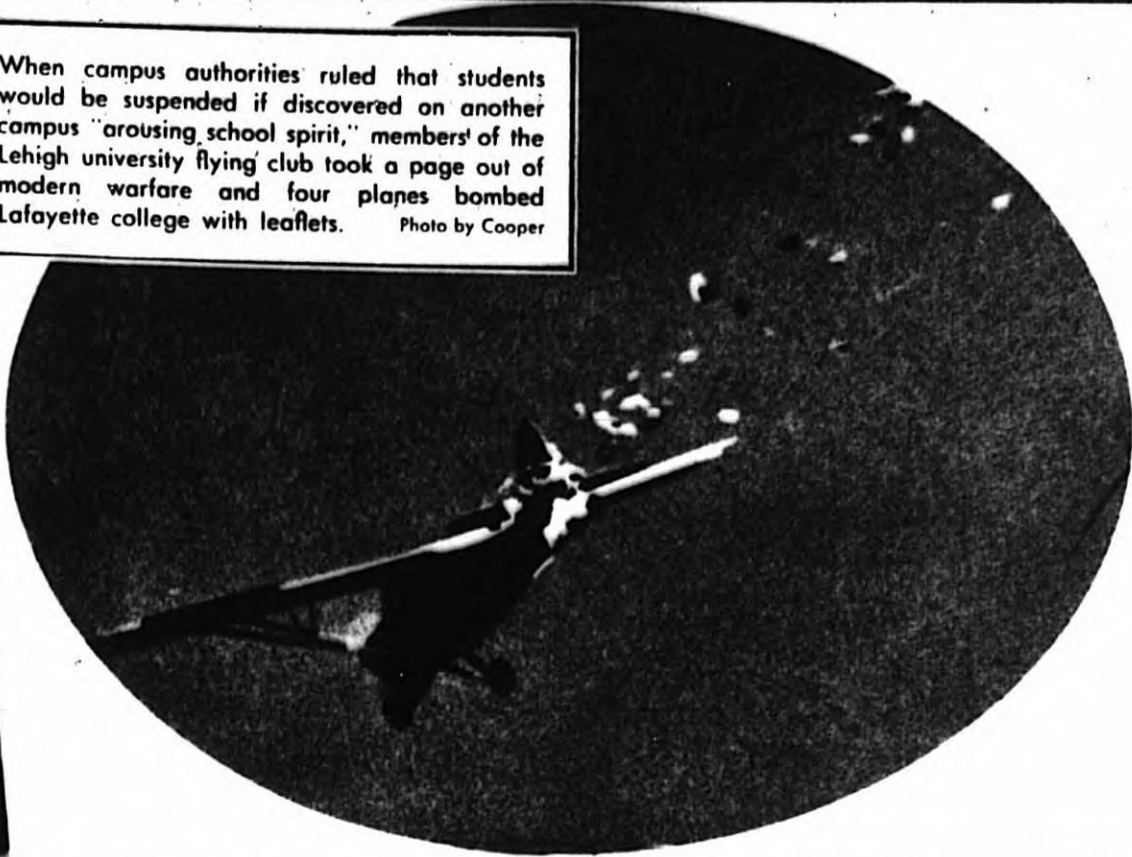

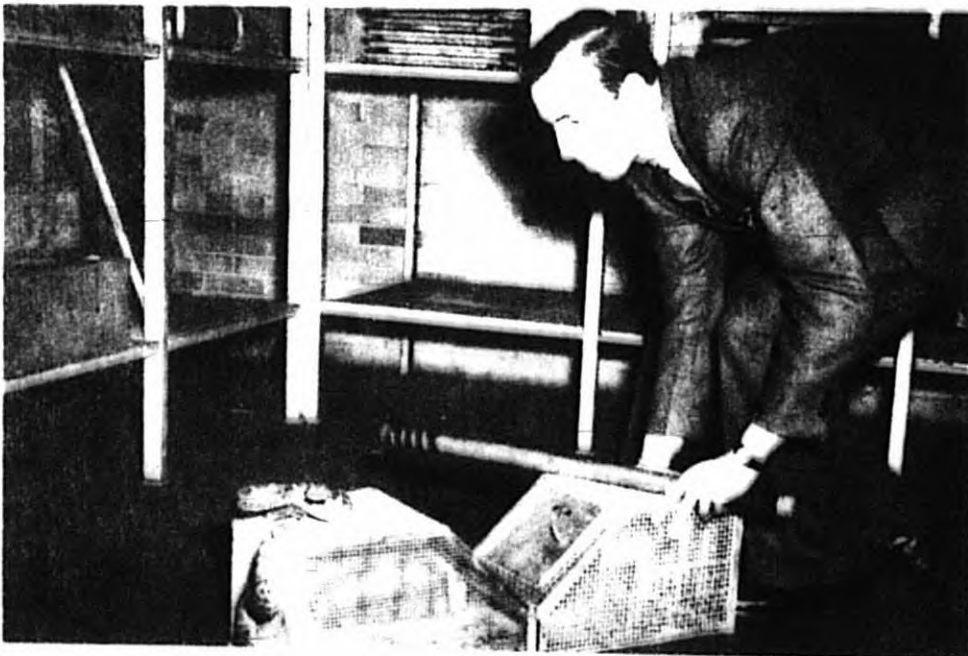

As College Digest was going to press, this foursome had just led Illinois to a 72-37 victory over Nebraska. Phillip led the scoring with 17 points.



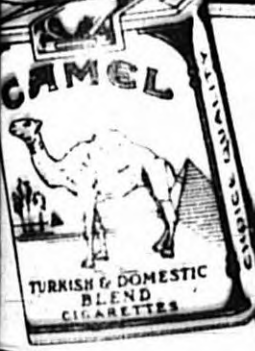
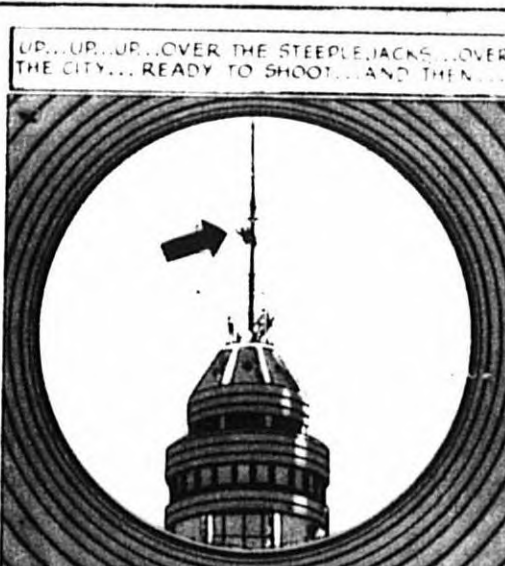
