SGA Unanimously Approves Reserved Seating Program

Student Congress unanimnusly approved a continuation of the reserved seating program at a special meeting Monday night. The previous week, the Congressmen elected to discuss the problems of reserved seating with the Athletic Policy Committee
John Allen, Student Government Association president, presented plan to the Congress which had
been aproved by the SGA Cabinet at a special meeting Saturday. Longer Distribution Period Allen reported that the Cabine ngreed and arrangements for ticket distribution would "go a long way in meeting the demands of those students who objected to reserved soating."
Allen pointed out that after investigation he was told by the policy committee that an ID plan would not guarantee all students seats. He said all students who the reats may get them under he said, had been strong factor in the Cabinet's decision

ID Plan Misuse
In addition, he said that a num ber of student organizations had misusted the ID plan when it had been in effect, by "saving sections of seats.
Allen told Congress Monday that
the distribution hours would be 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Tuesday through Friday, and 9 a.m. to noon on Saturday, for the Oklahoma State game.
Tickets will be distributed from Rm. 102, Fieldhouse, during the week and in Rm. 101, Saturday.
