### Varsity Election Set; Voting Begins Today

Election of Varsity Sue and Sam will take place today. Festivities and events of Shocker Rally Day.

Voting for the king and queen will be held from 8 to 10 at three voting booths on the campus. The booths will be located in Jardine Hall, Neff Hall, and in the Commons building. A voting booth will be set up at the auditorium for students to vote after the pep convo, according to Sandra Johnson, president of the Wheaties, women's pep club.

New voting procedure will be used in this year's election. The necessary admission charge will be 50 cents a person, and music will be recorded, according to Miss Johnson.

## Homecoming Queen Election Rules Announced by SGA Commissioner

Rules regarding the Homecoming Queen election have been announced by SGA election commissioner Claude Lee. All candidates must register no later than 5 p.m., Tuesday, Lee said.

Included in the rules are the following regulations: 1. Queen elections are non-political elections and no organized political party shall run a candidate.

2. All organized social sororities and women's dormitories shall be required to run a candidate for queen. Any other organization or unaffiliated student may submit a candidate for election.

#### To Collect Filing Fee

3. A candidate shall be a full-time, upperclass woman and must have an overall average of 2.000 or higher.

4. The SGA shall collect a filing fee of \$7 from the sponsors of each candidate to cover the expenses of posters, pictures, and balloting.

#### SGA to Post Pictures

5. The SGA will post at each polling place, a picture of every candidate. Any extra prints of these official pictures will be given

each candidate. These pictures may be posted on campus, but no other campaigning will be permitted other than word-of-mouth.

6. Any University student shall be permitted to vote upon presentation of his ID card. Each voter shall cast one vote, and the candidate receiving a simple plurality of the votes cast shall be declared Queen. The two candidates receiving the second and third number of votes shall be honored as princesses.

#### No Loudspeakers Allowed

No loudspeakers will be allowed for the Queen election, Lee said. He added that the votes shall be tallied from the voting machines by himself in the presence of two witnesses. The results will not be made known until the Homecoming game.

The Homecoming Queen will be crowned during half-time ceremonies.

## Navy Play Features Top Actor

Tonight and tomorrow night mark the final performances of a three-night series of Herman Wouk's novel dramatization, "The Caine Mutiny Court Martial." Curtain time is 8 p.m. in the Commons Auditorium.

Chester Morris, a veteran of stage, screen, and television, plays the part of Captain Queeg, troubled figure in the court proceedings.

Mr. Morris, who recently closed in the New York stage play, "Blue Denim," has an extensive theatrical background, beginning at the age of 15. He was originally with the Frohman Company. He has starred in 79 movies during the past 20 years, returning to the stage recently. Among the many television shows in which he has been cast are "Studio One," "Robert Montgomery Presents," and "Omnibus."

A University faculty member, Richard Welsbacher, instructor of English, portrays Barney Greenwald in the role of defense attorney. Welsbacher, with 14 years of dramatic experience, plays the part

## Pep Convo To Kickoff Activities

Today is Shocker Rally Day!

Officially beginning at 10 a.m., the day will open with the cheerleaders rounding up students in their classrooms. They will then head for the Commons Auditorium for a pep convocation followed by a chuck-wagon picnic and a street dance in front of the Commons.

Alan Johnston, pep coordinator, said a Kings-X wagon will be here to serve lunch to the students.

#### Indoor Dance Planned

At noon, the students will go to Legion Acres for an indoor dance and another pep rally. This will last until 3 p.m., at which time the group will return to the University.

Upon their arrival, another pep rally will be held at Veterans Field, as the Shockers begin their final practice, Johnston said. This rally is planned for 3:45 p.m. and will last about 30 minutes.

Planned by the Pep Council, Shocker Rally Day will take the place of the traditional walk-out, which was usually given the student body following an important football victory.

#### Walk-outs Outdated

Johnston said the Pep Council and some of the members of the administration felt that the walk-outs of the past few years had served no particular purpose as far as the team and the school spirit was concerned.

"Under this new plan we hope to attain this," Johnston said. "Shocker Week, climaxing with Rally Day, was planned with these objectives in mind. Our first and foremost purpose is to honor the Shockers and to close the gap between the team members and the student body."

## SGA Unanimously Approves Reserved Seating Program

Student Congress unanimously approved a continuation of the reserved seating program at a special meeting Monday night. The previous week, the Congressmen elected to discuss the problems of reserved seating with the Athletic Policy Committee.

John Allen, Student Government Association president, presented a plan to the Congress which had been approved by the SGA Cabinet at a special meeting Saturday.

#### Longer Distribution Period

Allen reported that the Cabinet agreed that a longer distribution period and arrangements for ticket distribution would "go a long way in meeting the demands of those students who objected to reserved seating."

Allen pointed out that after investigation he was told by the policy committee that an ID plan would not guarantee all students seats. He said all students who want seats may get them under the reserved seating plan. This, he said, had been a strong factor in the Cabinet's decision.

#### ID Plan Misused

In addition, he said that a number of student organizations had misused the ID plan when it had been in effect, by "saving sections" of seats.

Allen told Congress Monday that the distribution hours would be 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Tuesday through Friday, and 9 a.m. to noon on Saturday, for the Oklahoma State game.

Tickets will be distributed from Rm. 102, Fieldhouse, during the week and in Rm. 101, Saturday.

#### CORRECTION

## Class Photos To Be Taken

Class pictures of students whose names begin with A through D and of all members of sororities and fraternities will be taken from 8 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. next week in the Bridge Room of the Commons Lounge.

The \$1 fee entitles the student to a choice of two proofs. Ed Thompson, Parnassus editor, recommended that members of each sorority and fraternity wear similar clothing in order to achieve unified group pictures.

For the individual pictures, men are required to wear ties, coats, and white or light colored shirts. Women may wear blouses or sweaters.

## AWS to Sponsor Dorm Penny-Night

Associated Women Students will again sponsor a Penny-a-Minute night on Saturday, at Grace Wilkie Hall, according to Marilyn Murphy, chairman.

"Residents of the dorm may stay out no longer than 30 minutes past the 1 a.m. curfew hour—providing their dates have 30 cents to pay the AWS representative," Miss Murphy said.

This is the second year the AWS has sponsored the project. It is approved by the Dean of Women.



## Cut and Dried

Admittance to football games by ID cards went down for the third time this week. In some quarters it is hoped that this has sufficiently drowned the issue.

Frankly, we think the Student Government Association arrived at the only possible decision. Let's look at the facts.

First, an ID card plan is frequently misused by student organizations. Members of such groups reportedly have gone to Veterans Field as early as 6 p.m., the night of a game, to reserve several rows of seats for friends. Clearly, this abuses the ID plan.

Secondly, some students have "loaned" their ID cards to friends, visitors, and others if said students weren't planning to attend the game. This, too, is an abuse of the ID plan.

Moreover, an open section causes a number of problems.

And we point to such items of interest as the fact that every student cannot be guaranteed a seat under the ID plan. They can, and are, under reserved seating.

There are also other items such as the agreements made between schools as to the percentage of the gate. A partially-filled student section creates difficulty in deciding who gets how much.

The foregoing is also one of the reasons the seats are re-sold. And that is the case for RSP.

Our acquiescence to what SGA has done does not mean, however, acquiescence to RSP. On the contrary, we maintain there should be an open student section and that the seats should not be re-sold.

To follow this through would be a financial liability to the University.

Therefore, seats are re-sold in the student section. And there is a reserved student section.

We ask you to resolve such a dilemma. We think there is no out under the system the University fosters.

### Shocker Week Blasted To the Editor:

Shocker Week, National Jelly Bean Week, etc., this is not only ridiculous but also trite. It is a shame that a supposedly mature group of students who allegedly represent the student body must demonstrate in such a vivid fashion their complete inability to carry out their responsibilities in a mature and sober fashion.

A "planned walkout" at this time shows a total lack of faith in the football team, a total lack of foresight and restraint on the part of the SGA representatives, and a total lack of what is supposed to be the purpose of this action, "school spirit."

It is sad to think SGA has proclaimed publicly its thoughts that our football team, which made such a gallant showing against a supposedly vastly superior Cincinnati 11, will not even win one game this year. We are sure that this proclamation is of great interest to the players themselves. Next thing you know they themselves will be predicting their losses in the Sunflower in advance

of the games.

Is there no possibility at all that we will win? Cannot the SGA and Pep Council even envision possible triumphs over such teams as Drake, North Texas State, Villanova, or George Washington? Certainly the good washing by the team in its first two games admits a ray of hope in just one of these contests.

To gain spirit hardly justifies this action. What kind of spirit is it that takes a week to build-up? What kind of spirit is it that has to be pounded into people? This is not spirit. Spirit is what brings students out cheering, win or lose. Spirit is what causes a student body to suddenly abandon its everyday routine for a day of spontaneous tribute to its athletes. Spirit is shown most vividly in spontaneous action, not in planned action. Spirit, whether the SGA likes it or not, is an emotional factor and must be treated as such. True emotions cannot be turned on or off at whim like water from a tap. We are going to have spirit on Friday? We seriously doubt it.

Walkouts serve not only to provide a time for tribute to our athletes but also as a time of respite from the everyday school grind. With this semester only three weeks old it is extremely doubtful that this student body needs a rest. If so, what are they going to do the rest of the year? There are quite a number of students who don't seem to realize

they are all here to gain an education and are constantly looking for excuses to have a holiday. It is a shame that SGA apparently has a predominant number of these students in our ranks. It is high time that our representatives in SGA and Pep Council stopped acting like a group of high school politicians producing an amateur theatrical. It would be nice if they would learn to look before leaping boldly into something. They don't have to try and impress anybody. It is our opinion that this action, although an admirable attempt to bring out the school spirit, will do nothing more than destroy the true meaning and value of a walkout and also destroy the faith of our football team in its supporters. They might just as well be playing before empty stands the remainder of the season.

The 1958 Missouri Valley Conference cross-country season got under way yesterday with a meet at Pittsburg State Teachers College.

Last year, the University squad netted second place in the conference, trailing the University of Houston.

"We probably will not be as strong this year," said Coach Fritz Snodgrass, "due to the loss of two of last year's top runners, Ray Hampton and Ron Eeles. However, we are better balanced now than previously."

Eight men comprise the cross-country team this fall. The six varsity members are Lew Merriam, senior, juniors Larry Floyd and Jay McMurray, and sophomores Jerry Kraus, Delbert Voth, and Donald Hill. The two freshmen are Ray Wilson and Jack Menger.

The Shockers will host the Wichita Invitational meet at 3:30 p.m., October 11. The event, with eight colleges attending, will be held at the Echo Hills Golf Course.

**Tie Brings Smiles;  
Future Brightens**

The outcome of the Cincinnati game last Saturday night brought smiles to the faces of a large number of Shocker followers. The Bearcats were loaded with talent and on paper the Shockers just didn't have the material to handle them.

But football games are not indicated. The game left little doubt that the Shocks are headed for better days, and some of those days will be seen this season.

However, the game with Oklahoma State tomorrow night doesn't appear to be one of those days. The Okies have the prestige of having one of the top independent teams in the U. S. this season. (State is independent in football until it plays a full Big Eight schedule in 1960.)

The Cowboys are missing only seven of their 34 players from the 1957 season when they posted a 6-3-1 record. The replacements for the missing seven have filled the gap adequately. State has several outstanding players on the squad which will provide some fine football tomorrow night.

Keep an eye on Jim Wood No. 87, one of the better ends in the country. Wood caught 16 passes last season and is State's punt specialist, averaging some 40 yards per kick. Larry Rundle, Jim Wiggins and Duane Wood make up a fast backfield along with three able quarterbacks. Wiggins, from McPherson, Kans., scored ten touchdowns to lead the Cowboys in that department in '57.

Oklahoma State is just too tough for the Shockers, but look for them to play a surprisingly strong game against a top-rated opponent.

On the defensive side of the ledger, line coach David Hawk warned, "This is the most explosive OSU team in years. Their offense is wide open and you're going to have to play your finest defense to stay in the game."

Hawk wrapped up his report by saying, "this is going to be the strongest team we've met this year and one of the toughest on our schedule."

Deadline to purchase the Student Hospitalization and Accident Insurance plan offered by the University has been extended to Oct. 10, according to Mrs. Wanda Maltby, Student Health Services.

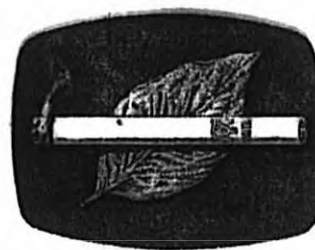
