
An all-school election for Homecoming queen will be held from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Nov. 2 in the main hall of the CAC.

Under his direction, the Singers organization has shown a healthy tendency toward quality instead of quantity and has been providing Wichitans the opportunity to hear some of the very finest works of the choral literature.

Student soloists-Janice Stinson, Soprano; Suzette McKinney, Alto; Donald Juned, Tenor; and Wrandell Waid, Baritone-all exhibited maturity, warmth and artistry.

The accompanist, Norman Linscheid, deserves special mention. He skillfully integrated the accompaniment with the voices and made the orchestral reduction sound as if THE READERS SPEAK it had been written with no in ment but the piano in mind. it had been written with no instru-

The "Te Deum" was written for the 250th anniversary of the delivery of Budapest from the Turks and was premiered in 1936. It is a thrilling example of excellency in 20th century choral writing. 

For the duplicate bridge enthusiasts, a challenging evening will be offered every Friday at 8 p.m. The cost is \$1 for non-university fans and 50 cents for students and faculty. 

Some days, it may take hours to get a connection because of atmospheric conditions. But on other occasions, contact may be made almost immediately.

The CAC will also sponsor a bowling team. Last year the team won 61 games and lost 38. The team average was 180 and in some individual cases it was even better. This year there is promise of an equally good team.







The new freshman basketball coach for this season is Lanny Van-Eman, according to the head coach, Ralph Miller. VanEman will also be used for scouting and recruiting


His new position moved Gary Thompson to the assistant basketball coach honors.

This was a much past-due piece of legislation was finally accomplished under Governor Anderson.
