The Libraries' Back to School Activities

Walking Tour of Ablah Library Now Available

Interested in a different way of viewing Ablah Library? Then consider taking the self-paced Walking Tour. The tour uses QR codes to link patrons to video content about the services offered at WSU Libraries. For example, if you scan the QR code outside of the Interlibrary Loan office with your smart phone, you will watch a YouTube video explaining the benefits of ILL and how to sign up for an account. In order to scan the codes, you will need an Internet-enabled smart phone with a QR reader. The QR Codes library guide (<http://bit.ly/whatareqr codes>) has information on free QR code scanners for different types of mobile devices.

At the moment, there are nine "stops" on the tour and with more in production. Maps of QR code stops and additional information on the Walking Tour are available on the WSU Libraries Virtual Tour webpage at <http://libraries.wichita.edu/ablah/index.php/tour> (the box on the left side of the page). You can also pick up a map and start the tour by scanning the introductory video at the table to the right of the Circulation Desk.

While it was far from the worst flood that the library has experienced, standing water in the basement did put two lower level study rooms out of commission for about a week. The disruption was minimal however as library traffic was lower than normal due to intersession, and thankfully the water did not reach any parts of the collection housed in the basement. A response from the Physical Plant and Ablah Library's Custodial Crew brought in water extractors and high-powered floor fans to get things back to normal as quickly as possible. Back to School Means Textbooks!

In the fall of 2009, Mrs. Marge Page donated funding to the WSU Libraries for a pilot project to make textbooks available to students. Mrs. Page said that she and her husband struggled to purchase textbooks while they were in college, so she wanted to help students who could not afford to purchase all their books at the beginning of the semester. University Libraries established the Textbook Collection in the Reserves area.

Special thanks goes to acquisitions, cataloging, and reserves who have devoted time to purchasing, processing, and transferring books quickly between the time the list becomes available and the beginning of the new semester. Over the last two years, the Textbook Collection has had 4,097 checkouts. One of the libraries' goals this year is to draft new guidelines for the textbook collection, based on the data gathered from 2009-2011. The original guidelines of purchasing textbooks for high-cost, high enrollment courses will be maintained. Additional guidelines will address book transfers from stacks and purchase requests. The goal is to help WSU retain students by providing access to textbooks when students simply cannot afford the ideal of having their own copy of every book.

Wondering about the most frequently used textbook? It's *Computer networking: a top-down approach* which was checked out 237 times from Fall 2009 to Spring 2011.

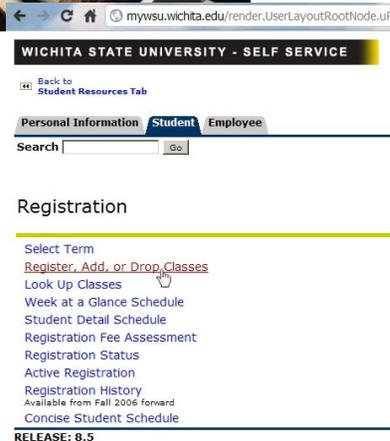
