### **Willie Baer Presents at the Conference**

The session was well received and offered strategies for dealing with student use of paper mills, educating students about plagiarism, and teaching techniques that minimize a student's incentive to plagiarize. The session was followed by a lively question and answer session.

**Reminder About Construction (Repeated from WSUToday)**

Conco Construction will temporarily block a portion of Gentry (the road that loops around the west side of the Police station, Credit Union, etc.) north of the National Institute for Aviation Research from Friday, Sept. 28, until about Monday, Oct. 8. You also will be able to enter the parking lots east of Ablah Library and the Heskett Center by turning onto Gentry by the university police station.
