Six candidates will compete for the title of "Ugliest Man" in the University Red Feather drive which opened yesterday. Votes may be cast by contributing to the campaign at a booth in the Commons Lounge.

The candidate, in whose name the most money has been contributed, will be awarded the title of "Ugliest Man" on the University campus.

Candidates and their sponsors are: Jerry Holland, Pi Alpha Pi; Hank Hemingway, Alpha Gamma Gamma; Larry Austin, Men of Webster; Gene Faluzzi, Phi Upsilon Sigma; Bob Fisher, Independent Students Association; and Francis Jabara, Faculty.

Contributions may be made from 8 a. m. to 1 p. m., today or tomorrow, according to Russell Watson, chairman of the campus drive. The winner will receive an "Ugly Man" pin, and his sponsoring organization will receive a beer mug from Alpha Phi Omega, national service fraternity, conducting the campus campaign.

Awards will be presented to the winner at the varsity dance, following the Homecoming pep rally, Oct. 26.

The Sociology Club is assisting the drive by taking general contributions in the halls of campus buildings during the Red Feather campaign. The Student Council is sponsoring the drive on the campus.

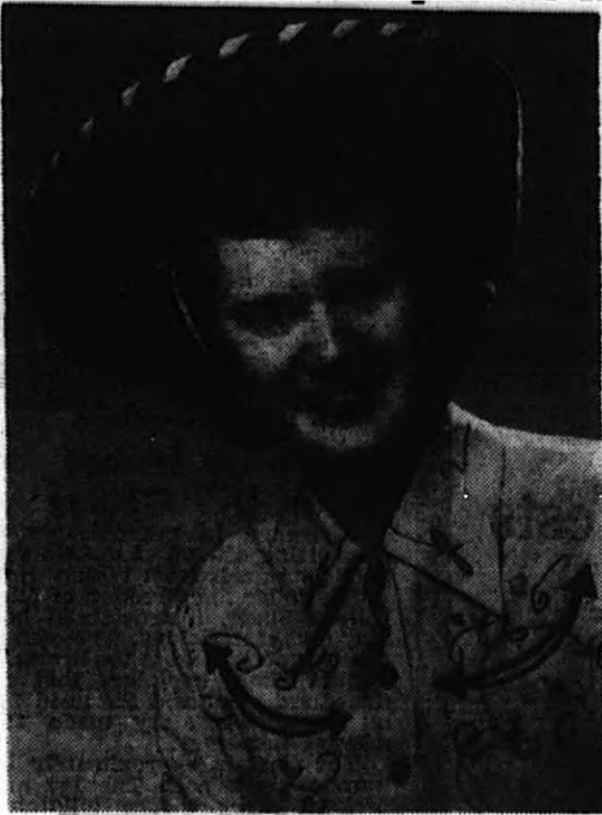
Students from several departments of the University are now gathering data from various Municipal agencies for use in the conference, Dr. Wall said.

Sunflower Called Pep Rally, Bonfire, Highlight 'Effective' Paper Campus Homecoming Plans

Homecoming activities will get under way Friday, Oct. 26, with the traditional pep rally and bonfire, followed by a varsity in the Men's Gym, the Student Council announced this week.

Activities the following Saturday will include judging of house decorations, the annual Homecoming Dance, and an alumni coffee after the Homecoming game with the University of Tulsa, Saturday night.

Crowning of the queen will be the feature of the Homecoming Dance Saturday, scheduled from 10:30 p. m. to 1 a. m. Tickets to the dance will go on sale Tuesday in the Commons Lounge, Gerry Hunter, varsity chairman, said. The price is \$1.50 per couple for students. Alumni need only pay tax on the tickets to purchase them.

University alumni will have a coffee in the east end of the Women's Gym, with seating for non-dancers at the west end, while the dance will be held in the Men's Gym.

Student Council officials said that dress for the Homecoming Dance will be informal.

Friday night, the pep rally and bonfire will be held west of Veterans' Field at 7:30, followed by the varsity in the Men's Gym. There, the "Bearded Man" will be selected by judges, and will be presented along with the "Ugly Man" selected in the Red Feather Drive.

Maurine Ramsey, Homecoming chairman, said that fraternity and sorority house decorations should be finished by 9 a. m., Oct. 26, since the judging will begin at 10 a. m.

Two other Valley teams—Bradley and Houston, will host New Mexico A and M and Hardin-Simmons respectively in non-Conference play on Saturday.

Oklahoma A and M scored in the first three minutes of play and went on to smother the University of Wichita Wheatshockers 43 to 0 at Stillwater, Okla., Saturday.

It was the first win in four starts for the Aggies this year, and dealt Wichita its third loss in four games. The Conference standings show the Munies have one win and one loss in Valley play. The Wichita-A and M series now stands at one win, one tie, and ten losses for the Shockers in 12 meetings with the Oklahomans.

The Cowpokes scored all six touchdowns on the ground, as they out-rushed the Shockers, 249 yards to 16. Dean Seeman, 185 pound halfback, cracked the Wichita defense for four of the Aggie counters.

After the Aggies got their hands on the ball, it took them only four plays to score the first T.D. After completing two passes, quarterback Don Babers took the ball and ran the last 25 yards. He fumbled on the goal line, but a teammate fell on it for the touchdown.

Several plays later, the Cowpokes intercepted a Shocker pass on the Wichita 48-yard line. They scored in five plays with Seeman cracking over from the five.

Seeman scored again early in the second period on a 26 yard dash. A few minutes later the Aggies took a Shocker pass on the Wichita 36. Bob Thielen, Seeman, and Babers carried the ball to the five. With fourth down, and one foot to go for a first down, Seeman crashed over for the fourth Aggie touchdown.

A safety added two more points to the Aggie cause in the second quarter. Wichita fumbled the Aggie kickoff and it rolled back to the 8-yard line before they recovered it. Halfback Herb Eddington was tackled back of the goal line on a reverse play for the safety. The half ended with A and M leading, 29-0. With halfbacks Eddington and

Ray Coleman carrying the ball, Wichita rolled for three straight first downs in the third period. The drive was halted on the Aggie 25-yard line where the Cowboys took over.

On an exchange of punts, Aggie fullback John Grabko took Eli Romero's kick on the Shocker 48-yard line and went all the way to make the score 36 to 0.

The final touchdown came in the waning seconds of the fourth quarter when Seeman broke loose and scored his fourth touchdown of the afternoon.
