Dear Mr. Wesson:

It is my present purpose to finish my work as President and Solicitor of Fairmount College at the close of the year 1906. By that date I hope to expect to complete my self-imposed task of adding to the resources of the College \$300,000 during the interval, May 1, 1904 and January 1, 1907. Up to this writing I have secured in cash or pledges one third of this sum, or \$100,000. The proposed ~~this~~ task done, the Institution will possess the following properties; about 60 acres of land, four permanent buildings of stone & brick, namely, Recitation Hall, (costing over \$80,000), Carnegie Library, (\$50,000), Men's Dormitory, (\$35,000), and Women's Dormitory, (\$40,000), frame dwelling used as a dormitory, (\$6,000), library of 25,000 books well classified, apparatus for instruction and research in Chemistry, Biology & Physics, half a dozen pianos, ^{much} furniture, and an endowment fund of over \$200,000, bringing the net assets ^{of the College} up to at least \$500,000 ^{or} January 1, 1907.
