'Trio' Nets Cessna Presents \$50,000 Grant \$600 For Library

Approximately 4,500 persons attended the SGA Library Benefit Concert presented by the Kingston Trio last Thursday night in the fieldhouse.

The concert grossed \$8,730. Profit from the concert will be presented to the library fund later this week. The total profit was \$1,609.17, but one thousand dollars was to be returned to the SGA and in repayment of the retainer fee for the Trio.

\$600 to Library

Thus six hundred dollars will be the amount presented to the library fund.

The Kingston Trio was paid \$5,153.32 (60 per cent of the gross) for their appearance.

During the two-hour concert the Trio performed many of the songs from their million-seller albums.

"Tom Dooley" Popular

The audience showed its appreciation for the Trio's songs and antics by calling them back for two encores. The number that started the Trio's climb to fame, "Tom Dooley," received the greatest response from the audience.

The Trio left, by plane, Friday to play a concert in Denver.

Debate Teams Set to Meet Tulane, Iowa

University debaters will compete in two tournaments this weekend being held at Tulane and Iowa State universities.

Making the trip to New Orleans for the Tulane event are teams composed of Marci Welsh and Bob Lawless, and Al Mattson and Quincelee Brown. Accompanying the group will be Prof. Mel Moorhouse, debate coach.

Traveling to Ames for the Iowa State tournament are two teams composed of Judy Wallace and John Elder, and Patti Wollsey and Paul Human. Paul McKee, assistant debate coach, will accompany his group.

The next tournament for the team will be March 10-12 when the Shocker debaters travel to Oxford, Ohio, to participate in the Miami University Invitational.

The team took top honors in the Kansas Interstate Debate League tournament held in McPherson Feb. 20. The Shocks had two of the four undefeated teams of the meet. The teams were composed of Wallace and Woolsey, and Lawless and Human.

The traveling prize of the Wichita Professional Engineers Society was awarded to the aeronautical engineering department by members of the society.

Electricians Earn Award

The Dean's Award was presented by Dean Kenneth Razak of the School of Engineering, to the electrical engineering department. The award was made for excellence in demonstrating the process of engineering education, according to Johnston. Judges for the award were Dr. Paul Tasch, professor of geology; Dr. John Brenzale, associate professor of physics; and Dr. Harold Huneke, professor of mathematics.

Cash awards for students projects were made possible by the Engineering Council, according to Johnston. First prize of \$25 went to Delmar Brim, Bill Elrick, and Max Frazier, all seniors, for their (Continued on Page 4)

McKinley Honored

A \$50,000 gift has been presented to the University chemistry department by the Cessna Aircraft Company in honor of Dr. Lloyd McKinley, retiring chairman of the department.

President Harry F. Corbin announced receipt of the gift on Saturday. He said the company had requested that the money be used for the proper equipping of the chemistry department laboratories to compliment the progress in chemistry education. Dr. McKinley has been chairman of the department for 33 years.

President Presents Grant

Dwane Wallace, president of Cessna Aircraft Company and a one-time student of Dr. McKinley, made the presentation.

"A large portion of the grant will be used to purchase apparatus in the category of instrumentation," Dr. McKinley said. "It will help greatly in our research since it will enable us to make investigations in our own laboratories which we formerly had to send away."

"The equipment will tie in nicely with the research grant we received recently," Dr. McKinley said referring to the \$13,400 award recently received from the National Science Foundation. Conducted by Dr. Luther L. Lyon, the project will be a study of the physical structure of surfaces.

A major portion of the apparatus will be installed in time for the fall semester of 1960, according to Dr. McKinley.

Bearcats Drop Shockers 97-76

The Shockers got off to a cold start and couldn't overcome the deficit Saturday night as they lost to Cincinnati, 97-76. Oscar Robertson, Cincinnati's all-everything, scored 37 points and set three new records, one national.

He scored 13 field goals to surpass Elgin Baylor's major college field goal mark. Baylor hit 956 during his college days. The Big "O" now has 968. His 37 points made him the highest scoring senior in Missouri Valley cage history. He now has 798 compared with the old mark of 773, set by Tulsa's Bob Patterson.

Robertson pulled down 25 rebounds to surpass Jack Twyman as the best rebounder in Bearcat history. Os has pulled down 1,267 in three years while Twyman grabbed 1,242 in four years.

Shocker Ron Heller had a fine evening before the Bearcat crowd and also before some of his family who drove 300 miles to watch him play. Ron scored 28 points and pulled down 8 rebounds before leaving the game on fouls. He received a fine ovation from the 'Cat fans'.

Lanny Van Eman also had relatives there and after a very cold start ended with 10 points. Gene Wiley and John Gales each had 11 points and Wiley pulled down 10 from the backboards.

Cincinnati nailed 55 rebounds as compared with the Shockers 39. Wichita hit only 26 percent of their field tries in the first half and were down 10 points at the rest, 43-33. Cincinnati hit 6 of their first 7 shots to start off the second period of play and this broke the back of the Shockers.

Chessman's Reprieve Raises Debate on Capital Punishment

Recently, Governor Edmund Brown of California granted convicted kidnaper and rapist Caryl Chessman a 60-day reprieve of his death sentence.

THIS WEEK'S QUESTION: In view of the recent developments in California regarding the Chessman case, what is your opinion of capital punishment.

Richard Harlowe, Liberal Arts freshman - Capital punishment should be abolished. The principle of an eye for an eye is a reflection of the barbaric mind.

J. B. Smith, Liberal Arts senior - Capital punishment is a sub-conscious rationalization for the individual to kill. If a society is willing to take a life, then the individual in that society will likewise be willing to kill.

Kay Pulliam, Liberal Arts senior - I think capital punishment should be done away with, especially in Chessman's case. He has waited for 12 years with the sentence hanging over his head. This, in itself, is punishment enough.

Bill Kentling, Liberal Arts junior - I'm completely against capital punishment for any type of crime.

It's not the proper way to enforce a law.

Tom Ebendorf, Business Administration freshman - Capital punishment should be abolished because it is a needless waste of life. The authorities should concentrate instead on restoring the criminals to a useful life.

Carolyn Fitzpatrick, Liberal Arts senior - Capital punishment has both good and bad points. For this reason, I think it should be suited to the individual case. If a person can be helped, then he should be spared, but if he is completely beyond help then capital punishment should be used judiciously.

Larry Grove, Liberal Arts freshman - Capital punishment should be used instead of long terms in prison because it has been proven that people who are confined in prison for many years become mentally affected and are rendered useless to society.

John Messenger, Business Administration freshman - I have never believed in capital punishment but in the case of Chessman, I'll make an exception. The decision of the courts was that he should be executed and our judicial judgment shouldn't be influenced by outside interference.

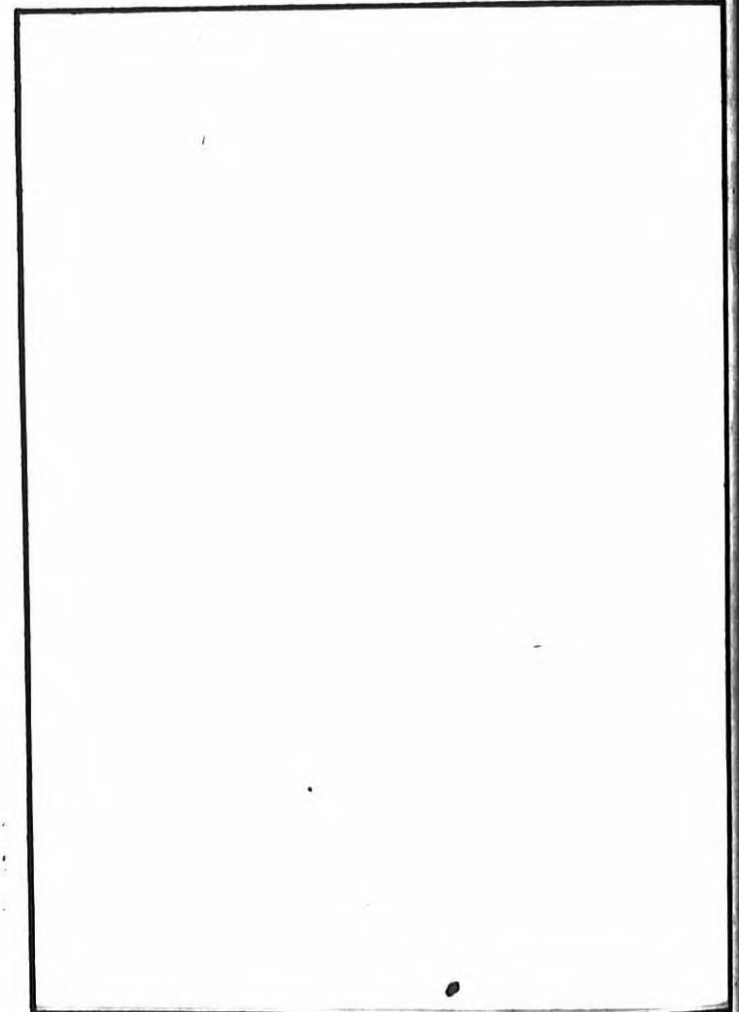

Alpha Chi Omega has started a best pledge award. This year will have her name put on a paddle. The best pledge of this semester was Judy Everett.

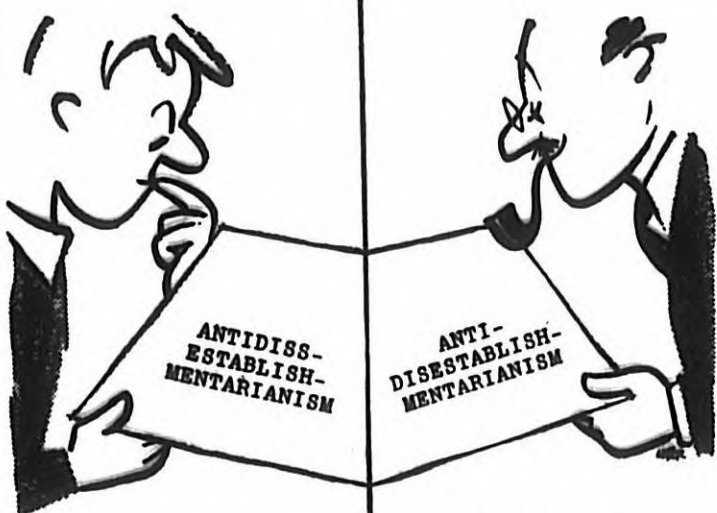

Delta Delta Delta sorority is going to have a party at the house Sunday, for the alumnae. Refreshments and bridge will supplement the news and fun.

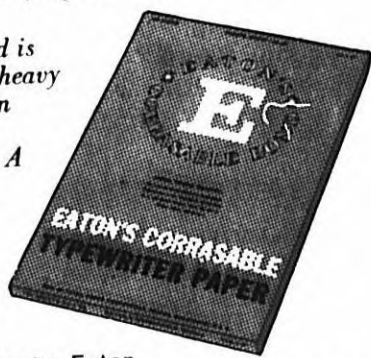
Alpha Chi Omega pledges have presented the local chapter with a clock in the shape of a lyre. This is the symbol of the sorority.
