PLAN ANNOUNCED FOR PARNASSUS SALES CAMPAIGN

Expect to Sell 150 Books; New Features Added; Pictures Must Be in to Insure Early Delivery.

The 1927 Parnassus went on sale to the student body last week under the new plan of sales.

Never before have the students had such an opportunity on a profit sharing enterprise. This year instead of the girl's societies competing for the honor of presenting the Parnassus girl each individual sells the book on a 10 per cent commission. However, put life into the campaign a very coveted prize of \$75 will be given to the society selling the most books.

This new plan was adopted by the staff to decrease the friction between societies and to make the load easier to carry. Heretofore the women of the University have had a great amount of responsibility in the sales campaign which required ceaseless and tiring effort.

Under this plan is expected that approximately 650 books will be distributed.

To replace the Parnassus girl the staff will conduct a beauty contest into which any school girl can enter. A committee of townspeople will make preliminary choice and the final choice of two beauties will be made by a well known movie star whose identity will be disclosed later.

These two beauties will be placed in the honor section of the Parnassus which will likewise contain the "Honor Fives," a picture of Miss Louvae Crum, honoray colonel; James Klaver; last year's all around athlete, and the kodak girl who wins the kodak contest.

Pictures Must Be In

The Parnassus pictures are being completed this week and those who have not had theirs taken should do so immediately because the annual this year will be an historical landmark and will set a precedent for University books. Society panels should be complete with every member listed.

The book this year will be complete with new features and phases of added interest. It will contain an authentic account of educational progress in Wichita, familiar, beautiful scenes of the city, a history of Fairmount College and the development of the University.

By far the larger part of the students have turned in pictures and to insure an early distribution of the book the staff cannot delay in pushing ahead.

Mr. Isley has been doing a remarkable piece of work. He has come into a close, personal contact with the Turkish people as has never been done before and which is extremely valuable. Through his influence the Turkish people are beginning to be raising. He has also been instrumental in encouraging the people in new methods in farming. Other helpful ideas he has introduced have been along the lines of sanitation which have been heretofore unknown.

PENALTIES SIFTED FROM STUDENTS BY HONOR COURT

Members of Psychology Class Who Received Failures in Course Have Sentences Commuted

The Honor Court of the University of Wichita has commuted the sentences imposed on twenty students who received failures for the semester's work in Psychology, when convicted of cheating in an examination about six weeks ago. This recently announced action of the court is due to the exceptional attitude of sincere frankness and honor on the part of the students in meeting the situation.

The court expressed a belief that the individuals effected by the latest decree had met the standard of honor in a satisfactory way and that these persons were not the only ones in the class who were guilty of a misdemeanor in this situation. These members will be permitted to return to the class and according to the instructor those who would have passed will be allowed to pass anyway. Those who were already doing unsatisfactory work and would not have passed will probably not be able to make up the work.

According to the court this is in no way a revisal of its first action but is a further extension of its power and authority in all matters of student honor. "It does not constitute a matter of backing down on our original stand but is an attempt to help those who had been severely dealt with," said one of the members of the court.

Fine Arts College Will Open Classes

Master Classes to Be Conducted by Dean Lieurance and Otto L. Fischer

Music teachers and students of Wichita will have new opportunities for study, when Dean Lieurance and Otto L. Fischer of the W. U. Fine Arts College will open master classes.

Mr. Lieurance will give master lessons in voice, repertoire and accompanying, stage presence, selection of programs, and styles of accompanying.

Mr. Fischer's classes will co-operate with other departments of the university. There will be lectures by Dean Neff, Dean Troxel, Dean Mikesell, and Dr. Branch. Mrs. Neidhardt and Ralph Brokaw will give special lectures on voice and violin methods.

Cooperative Plan Proven Successful

University of Dubuque, Iowa Sends Letter of Inquiry Concerning Plan of Self-Help for Students

The University of Wichita has again received recognition among the Universities of the country. Dean Frank A. Neff recently received a letter from the Business Manager of the University of Dubuque in Dubuque, Iowa, inquiring about the plan used here of self-help for students, whereby students work part of their time in our local industries or factories, alternating with other students and in that way they are able to meet all their expenses and complete their education without indebtedness.

The letter states that the University of Dubuque has always given much assistance to its students, but is constantly searching for better ways of rendering this assistance. It also says that the city of Dubuque wishes to establish a plan similar to the one used in Wichita for the help of University students.

This Co-operative plan is a comparatively new thing here in Wichita, and is proving quite successful, as will be seen from the number of inquiries concerning it which have been received by the university officials.

CAPTAIN APPLEJACK TO BE PRESENTED TONIGHT AT W.H.S.

Three Act Mystery Play to Be Given at 8:00 O'clock by University Players

"Captain Applejack," a three act mystery play, will be presented by the University Players tonight at 8:00 o'clock at Wichita High School. Tickets may be obtained from any one of the players. Prices are fifty cents for reserved seats and thirty-five and twenty-five cents for the remainder.

Proceeds of this play will be used to pay for the charter, installation and initiation fees of the Theta Beta Pi dramatic fraternity, of which the University Players will soon become a chapter.

"Captain Applejack," by Walter Hackett, has been recognized as a very exciting modern play. Archie Booth, as Ambrose Applejohn will take the leading role as an Englishman, bored with life, and one who craves adventure and romance. He receives it in full measure during the course of the evening. Mr. Booth's interpretation of his part in "In Walked Jimmy" and "Seven Chances" assures plenty of entertainment in this production as well.

Virginia Knisley as (Poppy Fair), portrays the part of a demure but sedate, old-fashioned lady. Gwen Graham is the vampire of the play. Willie Madge Bryant is a mysterious woman, Bill Hysom is a Chinaman and Hindo, and Devonn Quinn has all the fire and Russian Bolshevism in his characterization to fully deserve the name Ivan Borolsky, Mildred Clark is a motherly aunt—thoroughly English in type, who takes care of the heroic adventurer—lover, Applejohn. All these people have made very successful previous appearances in dramatic productions.

Advertising is being managed by Eugene Congdon. An unusual scene, the interior of a pirate ship, has been designed by the Theater Arts Class, which will also assist with the costuming and make-up.

This is the first play this year by the University Players, and is promised to be still more thrilling, mysterious, and romantic than "Enter Madame", and of a far different type than the Shakespearian darms.

STUDENT OPINION

A criticism recently reached the Sunflower stating that the paper was prejudiced and that only one side of a question was presented to the students. On reply to this accusation the editorial staff wishes to state that just as it is necessary for any paper to have a certain editorial policy and stand on leading questions likewise this is a necessity in a college paper. The policy adopted by the Sunflower is as far as it is possible just and sensible.

However, the paper is a student organ, and we are perfectly willing to print any offer provided it is signed and turned in in legible form. That is exactly the purpose of the Forum found on the editorial page—to express student opinion and sentiments, however this has been one of the most poorly supported columns of the paper. Recently an article decrying the honor court was turned into the office, but it was in such poor form that it was practically impossible to decipher.

It's the same old story all the time—knocking, practically no institution in the school escapes without it. Instead of just airing opinions to whomever may listen, it would be much better to turn in an article written in legible handwriting for publication in the Forum. We are more than happy to have all student contributions.

RESTORED BALANCE

There has been much discussion during the past few months about the over emphasis of college athletics, the lack of balance between scholarships and competitive sports and our "sports batty students." We print here the details of a very radical step which has been taken to restore the balance which is considered by some to have been lost. This plan is recommended as unique, arresting altogether praiseworthy. The policy in part is:

Prohibiting holding of pep rallies during regular school hours.

Prohibiting the giving of expensive awards to athletes, such as weaters, blankets silver or gold emblems; letters only to be offered.

Prohibiting the playing of games in rain, sleet, or snow.

Limiting the price of tickets to school children and teachers to twenty-five cents.

It is also announced that Dallas University, an institution which has been a strong athletic contender in its class, is doing away entirely with athletic games.

We present this merely for your consideration and discussion, expressing our doubts as to the universal acceptance of the policy.

Students at the University of late seem to have fallen into a mental lethargy, or some other state equally disagreeable from the lack of pep and enthusiasm displayed on the campus of late. Every one has something to crab about, everyone's disposition seems to play in a minor key colored frequently with dissonant intervals.

It may be that the approaching finals have something to do with the unusual atmosphere, but even that should not call forth such an apathetic attitude. What's the matter with everyone?

The writer would like to hire some Russian Red to throw a bomb in some auspicious place on the campus, if that would get a rise in students, but its doubtful if even that would have its desired affect. There's a great deal more in college life other than attending classes, dutifully taking notes preparing assignments and then walking noislessly through the hall to the next class. Shockers Beat St. John's In Hot Game of Basketball

The Wichita University five came out on the long end of a 41 to 31 score over the St. John's College team of Winfield at the Wichita Gym Wednesday night.

The game was close for the first half with St. John's leading off with a long basket to start the scoring. St. John's played a defensive game and counted practically all of their points from far out on the court. The Shocker five had trouble in getting together at the start but near the end of the first half they tied the count and secured a one point lead on some nice baskets by Davis and McCormick, the half ending 18 to 17.

The second half began with St. John's grabbing the lead for a few moments on H. Rosell's goal but McCormick slipped in a goal and two fre throws when he was fouled on the shot, and the Shockers drew away to a safe lead which was increased by some nice goals by Reynolds and Fullington.

The game was close all the way but the Shockers displayed the best teamwork and forced St. John's to take long shots at the goal which they seldom missed during the first half. The Rosell boys played a fast game and scored most of the points for St. John's.
