# Shockers Win Share of Valley Title

The co-champions of the Missouri Valley conference, Drake and Wichita, square off tonight at Allen Fieldhouse at Kansas University, in a play-off game that will determine the conference representative to the NCAA regionals, which begin here next week.

A packed house is assured tonight, as these two ball clubs meet. At least 10 thousand tickets to the contest were sold here in Wichita this week; several thousand more were sold to fans at Des Moines, Lawrence, and Kansas City. The traffic from Wichita to Lawrence this afternoon and evening will certainly approach log-jam proportions.

The Shockers wound up the regular season Monday night, by whipping a hot-shooting North Texas State team 90-83. Drake finished with a win over St. Louis last Saturday. Both teams compiled 10-2 con-

ference records. The game tonight will not be to determine the championship officially, since both teams will be designated champs. Shocker and Drake fans alike, though, are looking to this game as a real determiner as to who has the best team in the Valley.

Wichita beat Drake handily here in early January, then lost to the Bulldogs last month, by a one point margin. Drake lost to Cincinnati and the Shockers dropped one to Bradley accounting for the other loss sustained by the co-champions.

The KU site was the choice of the Shockers for the play-off; Drake had wanted the game on a floor in Omaha. A flip of the coin made the decision.

For Wichita, this season marks the first time it has ever shared a MVC title. Drake has had three previous ties, but has never won the conference by themselves.

## WU's Stone Football Trophy Becomes Object of Interest

The old traveling trophy football that was so diligently returned to the campus by some loyal WU students has been taken again by Friends University.

The following is taken per se win. The monument has been missing from page 6 of the Nov. 28, 1923, edition of the Sunflower:

"The Midian Shrine Trophy, a large stone football, mounted on a stone pedestal will go to the winner of tomorrow's game. Last year was the first time the ball was offered and it was won by Friends. It now rests on the Friends' campus but will be brought to the field tomorrow.

"There is an understanding that neither school shall take the trophy by a raid.

"The ball will be on display at the South end of the park and will be carried off by the winners."

These are the general rules governing the trophy. In 1931 Wichita beat Friends 33-0; in 1932, 20-0; in 1933, 38-0; and in 1935, 45-0. The 1935 game was announced as the last game between the Shockers and Friends University.

The ball then is legally WU's. Wichita University was the last to

Entrance fees will be \$3 for

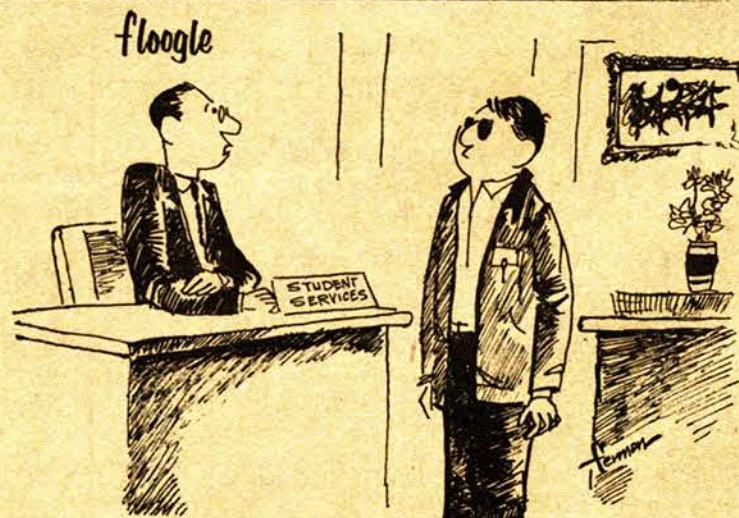
senior division, \$2 for junior division and \$1 for Class B junior division.

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# Big Dave Stallworth 20 Lellersmen Return Makes All-American For Spring Football

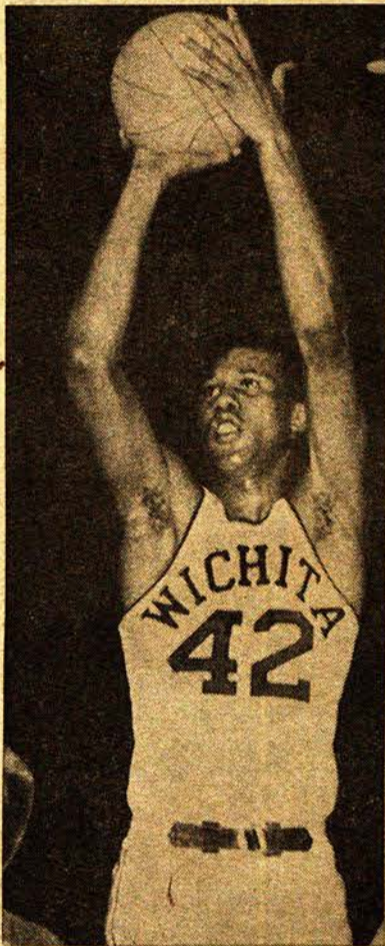
The University's basketball team has reached a peak of greatness, never before attained by any other Wichita athletic team. The naming of Dave Stallworth to two wire service All-American teams adds the final touch to the recognition he and his teammates have received.

The Shocker forward, who has pleased countless thousands, across the nation with displays of his remarkable basketball ability, was this week named to the Associated Press first team All-American.

On that select squad, he joins Bill Bradley of Princeton, Cotton Nash of Kentucky, Walt Hazzard of UCLA, and Gary Bradds, of Ohio State. The same five players were named last week to the UPI first team All-American.

Today, by official proclamation of the Wichita City Commission, is Dave Stallworth Day in Wichita. The Commission also declared this week, "Basketball Week," in the city.

Stallworth, besides capturing All-

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American and All-Conference honors, also snared the Missouri Valley scoring Championship, during the Monday night game against North Texas. He canned 34 points to finish ahead of Cincinnati's Ron Bonham in the scoring derby.

Dave scored 297 points in 12 conference games, for an average of 24.7 points per MVC contest. Bonham wound up the season with 290 points, for an average of 24.2 points per conference game. The Rave lead Valley players in all games scoring with an average of 26.5 points per game. He scored a season total of 689 points, breaking the school record he set last year.

Because he will be eligible for only one semester next season, Stallworth's chances for a third scoring championship are almost nil.

It is pleasing to report that the efforts of the mightiest Shocker have not gone unnoticed. The praise being accorded Stallworth by the fans, broadcasters and writers, is certainly well-earned in every respect.

Twenty lettermen were among 64 candidates who reported Monday for the first day of spring football practice at the University.

Head coach Chelo Huerta, MVC coach of the year, and his staff will be attempting to fashion another club capable of matching the 1963 feats of the Shockers. Last season Wichita posted a 7-2 record and tied for the championship in the rugged Missouri Valley Conference with Cincinnati, each team with 3-1 marks.

The WU coaching staff will have some holes to plug in next fall's team. Some top performers completed their eligibility last fall and the coaches will be hard-pressed to find top flight replacements.

The line is where the Shockers will be hurting the most, according to Coach Huerta. "We need players to replace two top tackles and four guards," he said. "In addition, we have lost three ends and R. C. Brown, a husky lineman we had been counting on for a middle guard position."

The Shockers also will be searching for a quarterback to replace Henry Schichtle. Also missing in the secondary will be halfback Beazy Stephens. "The backfield is good, however," Coach Huerta adds, "if we can find that quarterback. We could have the best set of backs in the midlands."

At fullback the Shockers will have standout in Pete DiDonato, a 195 pound line-buster. DiDonato will be backed up by the strong and fast Tony Penelton, 215 pounds, who was slowed last fall by injuries, and an upcoming junior, 190 pound Ken Schoemaker from Cheney High School.

Two sophomores, Bill Hollar, highly regarded 220 pound candidate, and Mike Popp, 190 pounder, round out the prospects.

There are 14 competing for the starting halfback posts, including seven lettermen. The experienced men are Miller Farr, Harold Myers Barry Peck, Sullivan Mills, Frank Regier, Jim Beveridge and Ray Patterson.

There are many bright spots on the line. Back at center will be Jim Waskiewicz and Frank Kostlich, a pair regarded by many as the best in this area at this position. Waskiewicz is expected to make a run at conference, area and All-American honors.

Only one letterman is back at the guard position. This is Chuck Sirianni, a 225 pound strong man from Pratt Junior College. Another experienced hand is junior Rollin Karg at 195 pounds. Nine others will be candidates for guard duty.

Four "old hands" return to the tackle slots. They are headed by seniors Dick Klein and Fred Buss. Klein is playing at 260 pounds and Buss, recovering from a knee injury, is listed at 240, Butch Davis at 235, and Jim Jones at 215.

At end the Shocker staff will start with two lettermen—seniors Herb Krumsick and Jackie Turner—and build from there. Ten others will be trying for the top positions. The big question mark will be quarterback.

First opportunity at the job will be given to Lou Confessori, a junior who understudied Schichtle last fall. Confessori will be challenged by seven others, a list headed by Gene Burlison, Jim Vining and Sam LoFaso.

"Everyone will get a chance," Coach Huerta insists.

The 1964 Shockers will tackle the toughest schedule in the school's history. The 10-game slate includes such teams as the University of Arkansas and Oklahoma State. The season opens Sept. 19 with Montana State. Home games with Detroit, Louisville, Cincinnati and North Texas State follow.

Spring drills will feature practice sessions on Monday and Tuesday of each week and scrimmages on Thursdays and Saturdays. Twenty-one sessions are permitted. The Varsity-Alumni game on April 11 will end football activities until fall practice starts.

Assisting Coach Huerta this spring will be assistant coaches Dean Pryor, George Karras, Gary Wyant and Bill Barger, and student coaches Charles Wright and Jim Maddox.

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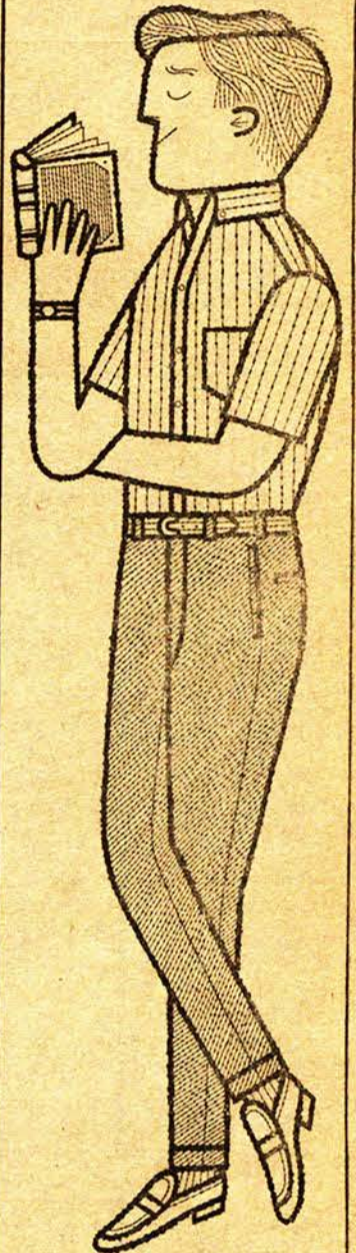
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## English Students' Essays To Be Aired on KMUW

## Rochester University Tries Experimental Living Center

Rochester, N. Y.—(I.P.)—An experiment in undergraduate living centers has been initiated at the "Towers," the University of Rochester's new residence complex. Aim of the new living center for juniors and seniors is to provide upperclassmen with a transitional experience in preparation for after-college living.

As a result, the facilities of the "Towers" resemble those of an adult apartment house more closely than the usual college dormitory. For example, the traditional dormitory arrangement — individual bedrooms opening on a long corridor—has been replaced by apartment like suites.

A typical suite for six students consists of a compact living room, single and double bedroom, bath facilities, and built-in storage areas.

Unlike the University's other residence halls, the "Towers" is coeducational. Currently, coeds live on seven floors of the Center and men occupy eleven floors. Residence in the "Towers" is open only to junior and senior students and is, of course, entirely voluntary.

Present "Towers" occupants participated actively in the various stages of planning and have worked out many of their own house rules — including strict standards of dress in the University's first carpeted dining center.

To date residents have voiced enthusiastic approval of the project. Students are enjoying the opportunity to entertain fellow students, faculty members, and campus visitors in their "apartments."

While acknowledging that the new center is an experiment, Joseph W. Cole, University dean of student affairs, notes that "at the University in all areas of our program, we seek to work closely with students in helping them to acquire a sense of purpose and a value system that serves as a basis for intelligent living. "We hope," he adds, "that the "Towers" ultimately will be judged as contributing to this end."

Armstrong, assistant professor of sociology at the University, and his guest, Mr. Sidney Alexander, former Executive Secretary of the Wichita Urban League, will discuss inequalities in opportunity for Negroes and Whites in regard to employment.

The television series Operation Alphabet will continue from 6:45 to 7:15 a.m., Monday through Friday, on KTVH-TV. The course is designed to help adults learn to read and write, or to continue learning basic reading skills.

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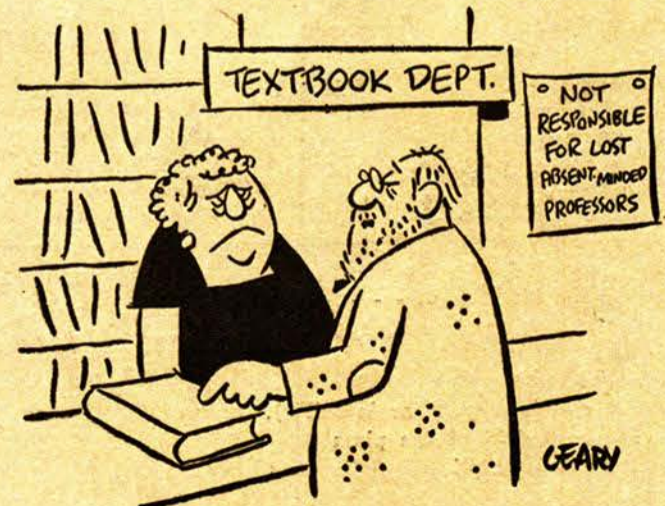
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
